MONDAY

UNDERWENT OPERATION—Mr. James Paton, who left on a trip to Montreal about a month ago is at present in the Royal Victoria Hospital there. His many friends will be pleased to learn that he is now recovering satisfactorily from an operation performed about a week ago.

"HOME FOR BURIAL"—The body of the late Gordon Jenkins, who died last Sunday in Boston, arrived in Charlottetown Thursday evening, accompanied by his mother, Mrs. W. W. Jenkins. The funeral was held Friday afternoon at Georgetown, services being conducted in the Episcopal Church by Rev. H. D. Raymond, of Charlottetown.

PROGRESS OF NEW HOSPITAL—The excavation for the new Prince Edward Island Hospital has been practically completed. A small amount of work remains to be done but it is expected it will be completed today. No further work will be commenced this season. The contract for excavation work which gave employment to some 22 men was held by Mr. Parker Hooper.

TAMPED WITH—The Summerside press reports rumors that certain fur shipments from Summerside to the markets of the world are being tampered with. It is stated that a recent shipment for London was opened between Summerside and St. John and twelve pelts stolen. The package weighed 130 pounds here and on being weighed there scaled 90. A detective was in Summerside last week in connection with the affair.

FUR BUYING STILL BUSY—Although shipments for the December sales have mostly been made, furs are continuing to come into Summerside in large quantities and are still fetching good prices. One man in the west of the Province received \$80 a piece for two very fine skins. Some of the buyers have left town to be in time for the Montreal sales, but there are others asking for pelts for the January sales. The furs are improving in appearance as the weather becomes colder.

MOOSE—ROBERTSON NUP-TIALS—An interesting event took place on Tuesday, Dec. 8th, at high noon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert A. Staver, of Wilnot Valley, when the latter's sister, Miss Lilia Jane, daughter of Mrs. Robert T. Moose and the late Mr. Moose of Kensington, was united in marriage to Maxwell, youngest son of W. Elton and Mrs. Robertson, of Summerside. The ceremony took place under an arch of evergreen and white bells in the presence of the immediate relatives. Rev. C. J. St. Clair Jean was the officiating clergyman.

There passed away early on Saturday morning one of Summerside's most highly respected and outstanding citizens, Mr. John D. Goss, at the advanced age of 83 years, after an illness of about a year's duration. Mr. Goss was a native of Hunter River, and was the son of the late Henry Goss, of that place. In Mr. Goss, Summerside has lost a citizen who will always be remembered as one of the kindest of men and one who loved the town and did his best to further its growth. He was a strong worker for the cause of temperance and was an elder in the Trinity United Church.

He married Miss Goodard, of Bala Vert, of N. B., who predeceased him some years ago. Since that time his niece, Miss Thelma Allen, has lived with him and tenderly nursed him in his last illness. Besides his niece, there are left to mourn, two brothers, William, in Malden, Mass.; George, in Canton, Mass.; and one sister, Mrs. Annie Pulley, of Bayfield, N. B., to whom sympathy is extended.

SUDDEN DEATH—Many friends will regret to learn of the very sudden death of Mr. Frank Sullivan, of Kinkora, on Wednesday last. Mr. Sullivan had been to the store to buy some gas for his car between three and four o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, as he intended going to the woods. He was found some time later beside his car, which was in the yard. He had evidently been pouring the gasoline into the engine when he expired. The deceased had suffered from heart trouble for years. Mr. Sullivan had only lived in Kinkora for a few years. He formerly belonged to Iona, near Eildon. He had been employed for some years in the Civil Service at Ottawa. He was 42 years of age and leaves to mourn his widow and several small children, to whom the heartfelt sympathy of the people of Kinkora is extended. The funeral took place on Saturday morning from the residence to the R. C. Church and Cemetery at Kinkora.

WEDDING BELLS—A quiet but very pretty wedding took place at St. Andrew's Church, St. Andrew's, Prince Edward Island, on Wednesday morning, Nov. 25, when Rev. A. P. McLellan, parish priest united in the holy bonds of matrimony, Jeanette Hilda only daughter of Donald J. V. and the late Mrs. MacDonald, Maple Hill and Leo V. MacDonald a prosperous young contractor of Boston, Mass. The bride who was given in marriage by her father entered the church to the strains of the wedding march very capably rendered by Miss Mary MacDonald, who also sang appropriate hymns during the mass. The bride was becomingly attired in a green ripple brocade suit with grey fur trimmings, green hat and matching accessories and carried a bouquet of American beauty roses. She was attended by Miss Mae MacDonald, Maple Hill who wore a brown broadcloth coat with brown fur trimmings, brown hat and carried a bouquet of yellow roses. Mr. Joseph Fisher, Fort Augustus, uncle of the groom performed the duties of best man. After the ceremony the wedding party motored to the house of the bride where a dainty wedding breakfast was served, only the immediate relatives being present. After a short honeymoon, Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald will take up their residence in their beautiful home, West Roxbury Mass. Their host of friends wish them many years of wedded bliss.

One of the worst fires in the history of Prince Edward Island occurred last night at Falconwood Hospital, housing the insane patients of the Province. The main section of the building, at the time of writing, is in flames, with the west wing and main section completely destroyed.

Three fatalities among the patients are reported. The financial loss is estimated at about a quarter of a million dollars. This loss may well be doubled if the entire building is destroyed, as it is feared likely.

Although the City firemen were on the scene as promptly as possible, they found it impossible to do anything to check the flames, the water supply being totally inadequate rendering it impossible to use the hose in throwing water to the burning upper sections. On their arrival the men found the upper section and roof of the west wing completely in flames.

It was in this section of the building, in the men's ward, that the fire is believed to have started. Its origin is not known.

The staff of the hospital, assisted by the firemen, city policemen, and hundreds of citizens who motored to the scene, made heroic effort to get all the patients out of the burning section of the building.

Unfortunately one patient, John McKenzie, Flat River, in Ward Five, leaped from a top window before he could be rescued, and was killed, his neck being broken in the fall.

Another patient, William McGuinn, Vernon, in Ward Four, is believed to have perished in the flames.

So far as The Guardian could ascertain last night, these were the only casualties among 320 patients of the institution.

Another patient, Francis MacDonald, Morell, jumped from an upper window, sustaining a fractured shoulder and forearm and internal injuries. He was removed to the Charlottetown Hospital but died half an hour after reaching the hospital.

DEATH REGRETTED—Many friends in Georgetown and elsewhere will learn with deep regret of the death of Mrs. John Whiting which occurred at her home in Georgetown on Monday, December 15th after a short illness. She was a true christian woman bright and intelligent, with a kind and loving disposition which endeared her to her many friends who shall long cherish her memory. She was twice married, first to Mr. Clark to whom she had one son Rev. P. C. Clark. Her second husband John Whiting, survives also one adopted daughter Gertrude, Mrs. Moorside, in Maine. The many beautiful floral tributes and messages of sympathy show the high esteem in which she was held. Her funeral was largely attended. Sincere sympathy is extended to the family in their recent and sad bereavement.

Falconwood Hospital is today a mass of smouldering ruins, the result of the disastrous fire which broke out between 7 and 8 o'clock Monday evening, and which raged with unabated fury all Monday night and until a late hour yesterday morning. A checking-up of the patients yesterday morning showed that in addition to two patients, John MacKenzie, aged 65, of Wood Islands, and Francis MacDonald, St. Peter's Bay, killed by falling from upper windows, six others are missing. They are: Michael Smith, shoemaker, Herbert Warren, North River, William McQueen, Belfast, Thayer Howard, North River, David McLeod, Bradalbane, Lemuel Compton, Bangor. Those who visited the fire site yesterday saw that the flames had consumed every vestige of wood-work within the main building, and if any unfortunate victims had perished, there is no doubt the bodies must have been completely cremated. There is the possibility of some of the missing patients having made their escape. Up to last night, however, no trace of their whereabouts, had been reported.

OPENS PASTORATE—Rev. J. A. MacDonald celebrated his first High Mass as Pastor of Saint Simon and Saint Jude's Churches, Tignish on Sunday December 13, when a large crowd attended. In his announcement he said that in his appointment as Pastor here he had been slated to endeavor to fulfill the footsteps of Rev. G. J. McLellan his illustrious predecessor of the past eight years. He asked for the co-operation and assistance of the Parishioners in carrying out the duties which were involved upon him and also requested the Prayers of all and especially those of the children, for his intention and guidance in the week before him. He was an instrument in the hands of God and as such would endeavor to carry on His glory, and the Spiritual and Temporal Welfare of all those under his charge. Vespers, Rosary and Benediction were held at six o'clock and were also well attended. Father MacDonald succeeded in St. Mark's by Rev. Phelan McKenna formerly of Tignish.

The remains of the late John D. Goss were tenderly laid to rest in the People's Cemetery with full Masonic honors on Monday afternoon. There was a short service at the home for the immediate relatives. The public service was at one o'clock in Trinity United Church and was largely attended. The Masons attended in a body and the beautiful burial service of the Masons was carried out in full at the conclusion of the church service. Rev. Mr. Campbell spoke very feelingly of the estimable qualities of the deceased. Past Master J. M. Nicholson conducted the Masonic service and gave a touching eulogy of their late departed brother. Prayers were said by Past Master A. S. MacKay. The Masons formed a guard of honour outside the church and marched to the grave where the impressive ritual of the Masons was carried out as the coffin was lowered to its last resting place. The pall bearers were Bros. Capt. J. S. Allan, A. S. MacKay, John W. Hogg, J. M. Nicholson, James A. Morrison and A. E. MacLean.

At a coroner's inquest held last night the following verdict was returned in the case of the death of two inmates of Falconwood Hospital:

"We, the undersigned, in investigating the death of Francis MacDonald and John MacKenzie, two inmates of Falconwood Hospital, find as follows: that Frank MacDonald came to his death from injuries received by falling from a top storey window of Falconwood Hospital in an effort to escape from the burning building. Also John MacKenzie came to his death by injuries received by falling from a ladder while making his exit from the burning Falconwood Hospital. (Signed): J. A. McIsaac, James M. Hennessey, E. A. DEATH OF FORMER ISLAND PASTOR—Mr. Major Schurman, of Summerside received word on the morning of Dec. 16th, from Vancouver stating that his brother-in-law, Rev. D. G. MacDonald, had passed away peacefully that morning at his home there. Mr. MacDonald was an Island man, having been born in Ugg 91 years ago. In his younger days he was well known in the Maritime Provinces, having had many Baptist Pastorates there. He was in Charlottetown as quite a young man and afterwards in St. John and Halifax, later going to Western Canada. He has lived in Vancouver for the last ten or twelve years and although not having a church he would supply whenever called upon to do so. He leaves to mourn, his wife, formerly Minnie G. Schurman, and two sons, Harold, in Edmonton, Alberta; Roy, in British Columbia; Muriel, in Vancouver, and Enid, in the United States, to whom sympathy is extended. The late Rev. Mr. MacDonald was educated at Wolfville, where he received his degree. He was married twice, his first wife having been a sister of the late Judge McLeod, of Summerside, where he was well known in his younger days. The funeral will take place today at 2.30 from his home in Vancouver to the Baptist Church and Cemetery there.

CANADIAN LEGION B. E. S. L.—The regular monthly meeting of the Charlottetown branch was held in the Legion Hall, Grafton Street last evening at 8 o'clock, Comrade L. T. Lowther presiding. Two minutes silence was observed in memory of and out of respect to departed comrades. The Hon. President, Comrade Colonel H. D. Johnston was then called upon and gave an interesting talk of the Dominion Convention and of the proposed amendments to the Pensions Act, to be drawn up and presented to the Federal Parliament at its next session by a committee named at the convention. He also quoted interesting extracts from Sir Arthur Currie's address regarding present pensions regulations which was presented in Massey Hall, Toronto before a large body of returned men. An interesting discussion regarding relief, last two pensioners and hospitalization then took place, the following comrades taking part. First Vice President L. W. Goodwin, T. Edgar McNutt and G. E. Island Hospital where the wound was dressed. He has now returned to his home and is resting comfortably.

CHARRIED FRAGMENTS—Two more skeletons were found in the Falconwood ruins yesterday, bringing the known total of death victims up to five. Three missing inmates are still unaccounted for, but little hope is entertained of any of them having escaped in the disastrous fire of Monday night. It has been impossible to identify any of the remains that have been found.

WORKMEN YESTERDAY were engaged in pulling down part of the wall at the west end which was in danger of falling. A government caterpillar tractor was used for this work. Efforts will be made to level other sections of wall and smoke-backs today.

THROUGH THE EFFORTS of Dr. Goodwill and volunteer workers a kitchen has been built to the Infirmary, and three army stoves are being fitted up for cooking purposes. This equipment will be ready for use by noon today, and will be adequate to supply immediate requirements.
