IMPROVEMENTS PRINCE ST. SCHOOL

Better Ventilation, Increased Accommodation Necessary to Health and Progress of Institution. Teachers Take Great Care in Their Rooms. Says Principal.

At the last meeting of the City School Board the following letter was read from Principal Seaman of Prince Street School.

To the BOARD OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES: GENTLEMEN,—In the "Report of the Public Schools for 1902," the Chief Superintendent of Education makes the following reference to the ventilation of the schools. "I have not visited one school-room in town or country which can be said to be ventilated." I invariably find the windows in use. The dangers which are inseparable from this practice are potent to everybody. Fresh air is indispensable to health, but draughts are fought with peril to those who are exposed to them. In the large schools in Charlottetown I do not remember entering a room whose windows were not open.

In reference to school accommodation he says: "The youngest children in Prince Street School are taught in rooms four feet below the surface of the playground, whose windows I have found invariably open, and have had to protect myself from the cool, I should say cold, breeze circulating about the heads of the pupils. How such conditions, in the interests of teachers and pupils have been permitted to exist so long, I cannot understand unless from economy. But what is economy when put in the scale with the risks to health and comfort? Infants ought to have the brightest, best furnished, most spacious, and most accessible rooms in the school building, for the work in these rooms requires great space and is chiefly conducted by appeals to the senses." Reference is also made to lack of hall accommodation and the necessity of it.

I have quoted thus largely from the Report, because the matters that the Superintendent asks to be remedied, are matters to which I have called the Board's attention on different occasions. I feel confident that if the Board fully realized what a menace it is to the health, and a hindrance to the educational progress of the pupils to have them kept in school rooms under the unfavorable conditions pointed out by the Chief Superintendent of Education, that immediate steps would be taken to rectify the evil.

The utmost care is taken by the teachers to keep the rooms in the best condition they can with the means at their disposal. But it is impossible to keep the school-room in a good sanitary condition without a proper system of ventilation. It is true that the conditions are not worse than they have been for some time past, but because an undesirable and unsanitary condition of school-rooms has been permitted to exist until the present time is certainly no reason for its continuance. I would most respectfully yet urgently request, that steps be taken soon as possible to provide a better system of ventilation and increased accommodation for Prince Street School. MONTREAL, April 8.—The great cotton strike at Lowell, Massachusetts, is having the effect of bringing to this province thousands of our French-Canadian who have been making a good living in the United States, but who are now compelled to go idle through the ordering of a strike for higher wages. To-day there were several hundred of the people, men, women and children, at the Windsor street station, waiting to come in from Boston. They will separate for their old homes in the course of the day.

N. Y. CANAL BILL PASSES.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 8.—The one hundred and one million dollar canal referendum bill passed the Assembly just after 8 o'clock, by a vote of 87 yeas to 55 nays, after a discussion of nine hours, in which party lines were practically abandoned.
