FOR A CHURCH HAT.

A correspondent writing to the New York Times asks:—Shall the women be asked to remove their hats in church, will they adopt hats that need not be removed in church? That is the question. We men have heard all our lives long about women's rights, and that was well, for there was much to be righted. But what about men's rights? Turn about is fair play, and there certainly is one right belonging to men which the women have openly set at defiance—the right to worship in church without having both vision and hearing shut out by the length and depth and breadth and height of women's hats.

This vexation we have long and patiently borne, and we respectfully ask the women for the sake of blessed charity to stop it. This can be done either by having their heads bare during divine service, as the heads of the men are, or by the substitution of a toque compactly trimmed, or a "Marie Stuart" bonnet, or any other appropriate style that art can devise for the unsuitable and out-of-place hats now worn in church.

This latter plan is preferable for two reasons. In the first place tradition and custom require that in Roman Catholic and Episcopal places of worship a woman shall not appear without some covering on her head during divine service, even if the covering be only a veil, as in Rome, and in the second place the conditions that prevail in a church are different from those that prevail in a theatre, where women are now obliged to remove their hats. Here a woman sits during the whole performance, and can rest her hat securely on her lap until she is ready to resume it, but at church she sometimes sits, sometimes kneels, and sometimes stands, and during these various movements it would be difficult to keep a hat from being crushed. Small and appropriate hats for church wear can be as bewitchingly pretty as large ones, and the designer who shall meet the situation and invent suitable designs will be a benefactor to a long-suffering community.

Charles Dickens in "The Christmas Carol" says: "God bless those women, they never do anything by halves." Certainly, no one would seriously say that those of our time have outdone our vision and hearing in church and ministered to our discomfort there by halves. They have done it completely year in and year out, and unless a reform is initiated by the generosity and common sense of the women themselves there is grave danger that ere long one of two things will happen—either a large number of men will cease to frequent church and refuse to contribute to its support, or public opinion will exert its power for the removal of all hats in churches, as it has successfully required the removal of all hats in theatres. Neither of these alternatives would be desirable, and the adoption of a suitable church hat seems to offer the only fair and honorable compromise, and would satisfy us, and "if it were done when 'tis done, then 'twere well it were done quickly," for it is easier to keep men in church than to bring them back when once they have left it.

TO PITCH THE "SPIT" BALL

There are many "fans" who would be utterly stumped if they had to describe how the "spit" ball of some famous pitchers like Ed. Walsh or the "Cubs" is thrown. In case the information should one day be sought of them, it is suggested and urged that they read Hugh S. Fullerton's wonderful article on "Pitching" in the June American Magazine. An extract from the article is as follows:

"There came into baseball in 1903, a ball which came near revolutionizing the game and brought a new era of pitching, made great pitchers out of 'has-beens' and poor hitters out of once mighty sluggers.

"The ball is nitched with two, sometimes with three, fingers held on one side of the ball and with the thumb, or tip of the thumb and nail, being gripped hard against the seam at the opposite side of the sphere. The top of the ball is made slippery at the point of contact with the fingers so that the sphere slides off with the minimum of friction, the result being that the ball, leaving the hand, takes heavy 'English' from the thumb and starts revolving rapidly in the direction opposite to that in which it naturally would rotate. Therefore it whirls rapidly for a short distance, until the natural-but suspended—motion of the ball overcomes the false 'English' applied by the thumb, and a contest between the natural twist overcomes the false one, and then the ball darts just as it would have done if it had been curved naturally, shooting in the direction in which the heaviest friction was applied. A spit ball, if pitched directly downward, darts almost straight downward, and, if pitched sideward with the thumb toward the body, it shoots outward and down as a fast overcurve does, the quickness and speed of the break depending entirely upon the amount of force with which it was thrown and in ratio to the amount of friction applied by the thumb. Great strength and speed are essential to the best pitching of this kind of ball."

Tomato Entree.
A delicious entree served at an informal luncheon is a tomato pie. The tomatoes are sliced and quartered, then stewed with plenty of butter, salt, pepper, paprika, a few drops of onion juice, and if the tomatoes are very sour a little sugar.

When cooked pour the mixture into a baking dish and cover with a rich puff paste. Bake until a delicate brown and serve very hot. Tomatoes may be served in individual dishes with the paste covers. Care must be taken that the dish is not too shallow.

Plum Pudding.
Soak one cup of bread crumbs in two cups of boiling milk, add five tablespoons of sugar, one tablespoon of butter and five well-beaten eggs. Add one cup of plums and one cup of raisins, and mix thoroughly. Put in a buttered pudding mold, set in a pan of boiling water in the oven, cover and bake for one hour. Serve with sweetened cream.

Hot Chicken Sandwich.
Remove bones from stewed chicken, or meat through food chopper and grind. Put between rounds of bread (not as thick as for cold sandwich). Make a rich gravy from stock in which chicken was cooked. When ready to serve, pour hot gravy over sandwiches and serve with mashed potatoes.

Blueberry Pudding.
One-half cup butter, one cup sugar, three eggs. Beat all together, sift two cups flour with two level teaspoons baking powder and add to the mixture alternately with one cup milk. Stir in 2½ cups blueberries, bake three hours and eat with sauce.

French-Fried Onions.
Peel onions, cut in one-fourth inch pieces, and separate into rings. Dip in milk, drain and dip in flour. Fry in lard, drain and sprinkle with salt. Serve with steak.

Should Chill Vegetables.
Radishes and cucumbers should lie in ice cold water for at least an hour before being sent to the table.
