K. OF C. ADDRESSED.—After the regular meeting of the K. of C. Monday night the chair was taken by Mr. F. J. Casey, Lecturer, who announced the first of a series of lectures by Dr. McGuigan. The Doctor then addressed the large number present dealing with the history of medicine and prevention of disease. He dealt particularly with the efforts of the profession at the present time to educate old and young in the carrying out of the necessary hygienic measures, whereby defective development may be avoided and the cause of disease eliminated. A hearty vote of thanks, moved by Grand Knight, J. A. McDonald, and seconded by Bro. Sixtus McLellan, was tendered the lecturer at the close of the address by the chairman.

BAD FIRE AT FORTUNE.—A fire at Fortune Monday night destroyed Dingwell's Mill, valued at \$2,000. The owner of the mill is at present in the United States. Mr. Wm. Dingwell, a relative who lives nearby, said he could not account for the fire which broke out at 10 o'clock. It was at that time that some parties who were fishing had been in the building smoking. The fire was first noticed by Vincent Windsor and Barry O'Donnell, city, who were motoring from East Lake. They gave the alarm to neighbors and got buckets of water but the flames had made such headway that the building could not be saved. 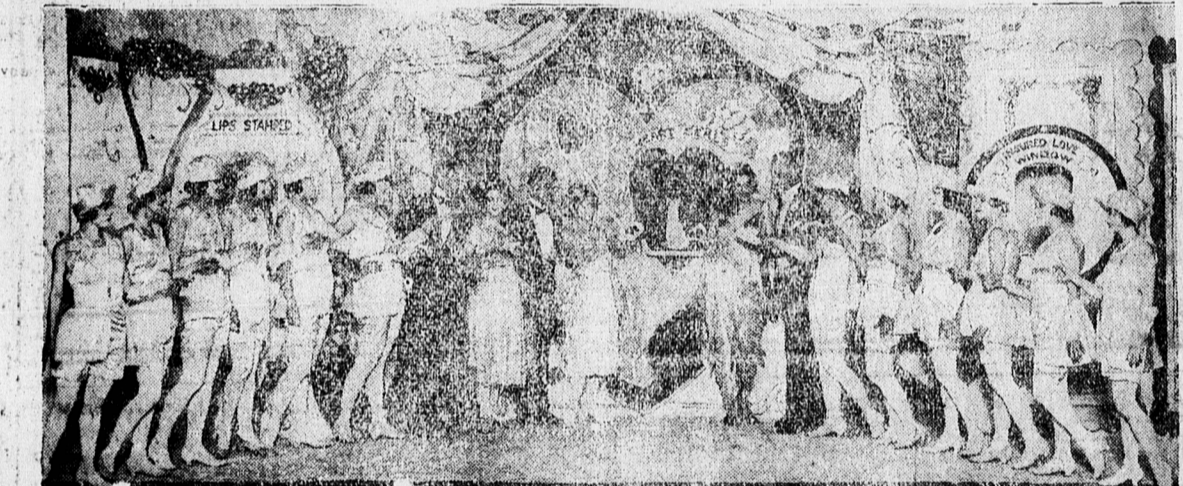

OUR DAIRY CIRCUIT

While the production of cheese has decreased in Canada during the present century, the making of creamery butter and of condensed milk products has greatly increased. In 1900 the production of cheese in this country was 220,833,269 pounds; in 1922 it was 134,530,053 pounds. In the first year of the century, 36,986,739 pounds of creamery butter was produced; last year the production amounted to 146,862,517 pounds. In 1900 the condensed milk products amounted in value to \$269,520; last year they reached \$6,839,232. The butter output of the Prairie Provinces in last dozen years has increased enormously. From being importers those provinces have become exporters, and their products have received a good reception in the British market. As regards cheese it is plain that she must adopt progressive measures such as that inaugurated on April 1 of the present year, when the official standard of factory cheese and butter intended for export commenced in Nova Scotia, government graded cream at the creamery gradually being instituted with good results, so far as butter-making is concerned.
