British subjects who travelled at their own cost from the United States or other parts of the world to join their country's military forces during the war with Germany are entitled to receive re-funds of their passage money according to a notice received by the British Embassy. All claims must be submitted to the British War Office or to a "recognized military authority," the notice said, before December 31 and must give the particulars of service rendered by the claimant.

Child Welfare Campaign

During Exhibition Week quite a number of people had the pleasure of hearing addresses given by Mrs. Hasbrouck on the subject of Child Welfare.

Mrs. Hasbrouck, who is the Field Secretary of the National Child Welfare Association, United States, was brought to the Province by the Red Cross Society.

The subject of mal-nutrition, its relation to proper food and vitamins in the physical development of the child, were clearly brought out in her addresses, as were many other phases of the subject of Child Welfare.

The weighing and measuring tests carried out at the Exhibition showed that out of 56 children examined, 41 were found to be under weight, 12 were over weight and 3 normal. It was also brought out that in four schools medically examined, 851 children were found to be in abnormal conditions of health, only 285 were found to be normal.

Statistics were also shown, that of the deaths in the province, infants under one year made up between seven and eight per cent.

In view of the great need of something being done to attempt to overcome such abnormal conditions and others of equal importance, a temporary committee was formed at a meeting presided over by Mrs. Justice Haszard, chairman of the Red Cross Society, to go into the subject. The committee reported 9-3-20, when the following prospectus was presented and passed unanimously:

"We, your committee appointed to prepare the way for the founding of a society in the interest of Child Welfare and General Public Health in the Province, beg to submit the following prospectus for your consideration:

NAME:—1. The name of the society to be known as the Prince Edward Island Child Welfare and Public Health Association.

MEMBERS:—2. Members of said association to be composed of representatives from parliament, city and town councils, school inspectors, professors and teachers, Women's Institutes, Daughters of the Empire, clergy of all denominations, members of medical profession, executive of business and fraternal organizations, trade and labor councils and recognized social workers and others likely to be interested.

FEE:—3. An annual membership fee to be charged, the amount to be fixed by the society.

ORGANIZATION:—4. The association to be composed of the following officers, to be elected at the annual meeting, from the above members representing the various parts of the Island:

Patron
President
Vice president, one for each Co.
Treasurer and a secretary.
Executive committee.

Executive officers, to be known as medical directors, under whom will be employed trained nurses.

OBJECT:—(a) —5: For the purpose of instituting an educational campaign, in the interest of Child Welfare and General Public Health throughout the province, having regard to the program adopted by the Canadian Red Cross Society, to collect facts and urge reform.

(b) —Providing for the general health examination of children of school age, including the mental defectives and the problem of their segregation and special training.

(c) —The establishing of health clinics in each county and suitable localities, the work of the clinic to embrace the following:

1st.—For pre-natal conditions, for advice to expectant mothers, in matters relating to their health.

2nd.—An infant welfare clinic, providing advice and free teaching to mothers in care, managing and feeding of infants.

3rd.—Tuberculosis clinic, persons living in the same house, as a consumptive, to be examined.

4th.—The school clinic, chiefly for the purpose of providing dental treatment free or at cost.

RECOMMENDATION — The committee strongly recommends the formation of such an association, and hopes that ways and means may be devised for carrying out successfully this or any other program, as it is a work of vital importance and interest to the province.

REMARKS:—What such membership can do to forward the movement.

1.—Inform yourself regarding those factors which interfere with mental and physical efficiency and which may result in inefficiency and disease.

2.—Make the facts generally known.

3.—Refrain from those acts and habits which are likely to result in physical or mental disorder.

4.—See the relatives, friends and acquaintances, child or adult who seem to be suffering from bad physical or mental habits, are given this information, and that proper medical care is provided without delay.

5.—Familiarize yourself with all projects that make for the betterment of the individual, the environment and the home and lend your voice and influence in carrying them into effect.

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people of this province give active support. An opportunity will be given when the general meeting for organization is called.

Representatives of the customs departments of Great Britain and all the British dominions are to have a conference in London, England, in February next. The object of their meeting is to bring about, if possible, uniformity of forms—such as entry forms, invoices and the like—used in the customs service throughout the Empire. Canada will be represented at the gathering. It has not yet been definitely decided who will attend, but the name of S. W. McMichael, chief and general inspector of customs, has been mentioned.

Inland revenue for September totalled practically twelve millions of dollars. This means that revenue from this source for the fiscal year will be close upon 150 millions, something which, added to the fact that income customs and other revenue this year will be little short of \$550,000,000. When one remembers that last year's revenue—which was the greatest in the country's history—totalled only \$380,000,000, some idea is had of the greatness of this year's probable figures. The truth is that within the past six months, thanks to the Government's new taxation, placed where it is most easily borne, Canada's financial position has vastly improved. Six months ago financial and political leaders were gravely shaking their heads and wondering where the

country was going to get sufficient money to meet its fixed charges, to cut a slice off the public. Today enough money is in sight to besides.

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
