CANADA, BIGGEST CUSTOMER OF U. S. DURING MAY LAST

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Canada was the principal customer of the United States in foreign trade during May.

The Department of Commerce announced today that exports to Canada in May were valued at \$97,640,810, compared with \$88,955,818 for the same period last year, while imports from Canada were valued at \$44,329,831, compared with \$43,182,817. The United Kingdom ranked second in exports, the value for last May being \$54,532,527, compared with \$61,833,783 while imports were \$29,752,554 against \$34,846,714.

TENNIS STARS ROUT BRITISH

BERLIN, July 12.—Germany's tennis stars, springing a sensational upset, routed the British forces today in the opening two singles matches of the European zone Davis cup matches. Hans Moldenhauer defeated the English ace H. W. "Bunny" Austin 6-4, 6-2, 6-3, after Dr. H. P. Preen had disposed of J. C. Gregory in equally decisive fashion, 6-3, 6-2.

The straightest character of the German's victories, was even more surprising than the double defeat of the British, who went into the final round favored to win. Germany now needs only one more victory, either in the doubles tomorrow or in the closing singles matches Sunday, to win the European zone competition and play the United States for the right to challenge France for the classic Davis cup.

Last year Great Britain put out Germany in the third round.

motion to this effect was adopted. Mrs. Moore of Halifax, was then introduced by Rev. Mr. Jeans. Mrs. Moore gave a very inspiring address on foreign missions and spoke with the highest praise of the work of the W. M. S. of the Presbyterian Church and especially of the eastern division. They have the unique distinction of being the first to send a missionary into foreign fields and that missionary was Rev. Dr. Geddes of P. E. I. Mrs. Moore in a very fluent manner went on to speak of the marvelous way in which the mission work of the Presbyterian Church in Korea was brought back to them two years after the disruption.
