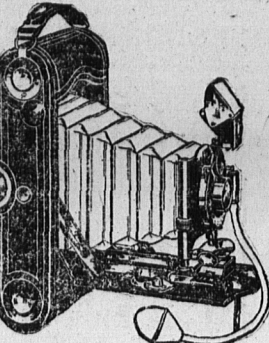

FUNERAL OF THE LATE MR. J. H. CUDMORE.—The funeral of the late Mr. John H. Cudmore took place from the P. E. I. Protestant Orphanage at Mt. Herbert Friday morning April 13th. A special train left the City at 6.45 a. m. conveying a good number of members of the L. O. A. and other friends to Mt. Herbert. A brief funeral service was conducted at the Orphanage by the Rev. Daniel MacLean who delivered a very appropriate address from John 13:7:—"What I do thou knowest not now; but thou shalt know hereafter." He was assisted in the service by the Rev. E. S. Weeks, and Captain Condie of the Salvation Army. One of the most touching parts of the service was the singing of the Hymns by the children of the Orphanage under the direction of Professor Hurst their efficient teacher. Notwithstanding the early hour of the morning the service was a very large attendance of the friends from Mt. Herbert and the surrounding districts. The pall bearers were Messrs. Hammond Kelly, Ernest Mutch, F. T. Morrow, R. K. Brace, J. J. Storey, and Mack MacLeod. The special train returned to the City about 8.45 o'clock and then proceeded to Wellington Station where service was held in the Methodist Church. The sermon was delivered by the Rev. Daniel MacLean who took for his text:—"What is man that thou art mindful of him or the Son of man that thou dost visit him?" He was assisted in the service by the Rev. Mr. Young of Bellefleur and Rev. Mr. Leard of Pleasant Valley. The body was then taken charge of by Union L. O. L. of which the deceased was a high respected member and conveyed to Union Cemetery for interment. The funeral was one of the largest seen in this part of the country for some time. The floral tributes were numerous.

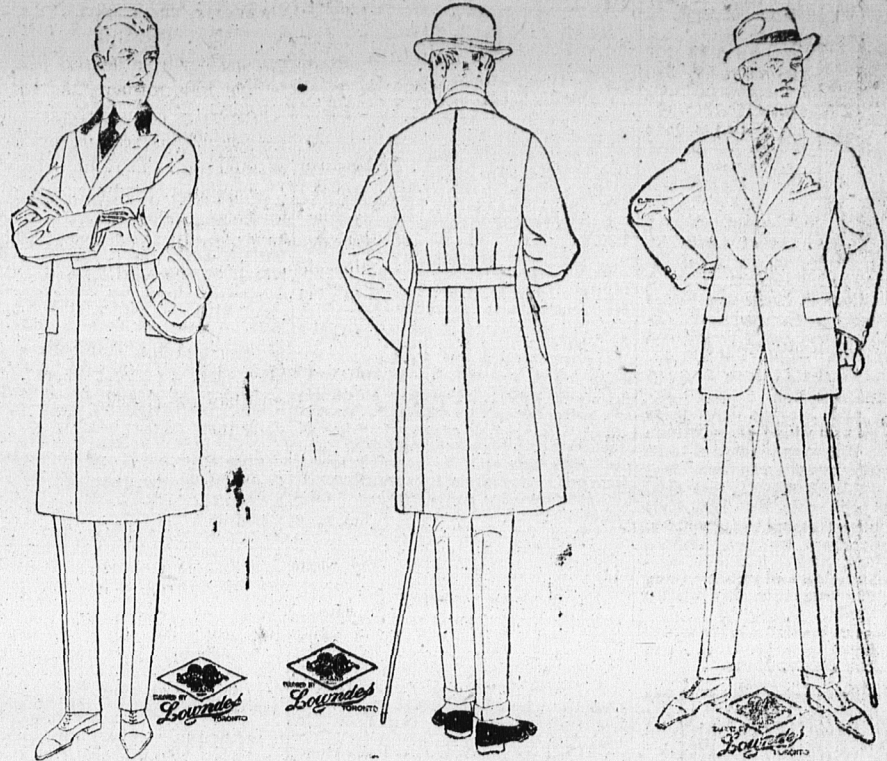

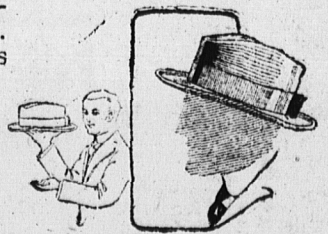

NEW YORK, April 14.—If the price of wheat and flour continues to soar New Yorkers may soon be eating bread made out of banana flour or rice flour. Bakers throughout the city are seriously considering the adoption of substitutes for wheat flour, which are said to be cheaper and more nutritious.

Experts declare that bread made from either banana flour or rice flour is more nutritious than wheat bread. Banana flour bread, however, has a peculiar sweetish flavor. Rice flour makes a close-grained white bread, which is said to be especially appetizing and nutritious. It costs a little more than some of the other substitute breads, however.
