SOME PUBLIC ACTIVITIES IN THIS PROVINCE.

With the opening of the spring season comes renewed activity in both private and public affairs. The farmers get busy with fencing, plowing and sowing, trade, shipping and industry in their various forms become busy, fishing and lobster canning, dairying and orchard work are entered upon with zest and our small community becomes a veritable hive of human activity. It is gratifying to know that along with so much individual activity, the powers that control our public affairs are also bestirring themselves to improve our shipping and transportation facilities.

We are told that the Minister of Railways is expected here within a week or ten days to take stock of the situation on the ground and develop his plan of campaign for establishing the Car Ferry and the promised change of gauge of the Prince Edward Island Railway. Hon. Mr. Cochrane is widely known as a man of great executive energy and activity, who takes a keen interest in these great projects for improving our system of transportation, so long and so greatly neglected. The vast and vital importance of the projected improvements, the long delays of the past and the high hopes that have been built upon the promised Ferry and the standardisation of the railway gauge, all add to the widespread desire to see a beginning made and will add to the interest with which the Minister's coming is awaited.

And along with other movements and improvements this promises to be a season of unusual activity in dredging and harbor improvement. Already, although the season is a late one, the dredges are getting to work.

The dredge Pownal, now at Summerside, has work blocked out for that port, Tignish, Miminigash and other harbors. The Prince Edward begins work in Charlottetown harbor today and will later engage in dredging at Hickey's, Mount Stewart and Rocky Point. Meanwhile the dredge Montague, now at Souris, will complete some needed work there, thence proceeding to Panmure Island, Montague, Bay View and other harbors.

Of not less importance is the work of repairing and improving the highways of the Province. In this almost every individual resident has a direct and personal interest. The road act has been changed from what it was in past years, with the object of giving increased local control and increased local interest in creating and maintaining good roads from the farmer's door to the railways, markets and shipping ports. In part the changes made are experimental and must await the result of trial and experience before a final judgment can be pronounced upon it, but we sincerely hope and trust that the changes may be productive of good. At least something will be learned as the result of the changes made, which can be utilised in perfecting the road system hereafter.

Much more might have been done and attempted were more money available for road and bridge improvement, as would have been the case had not the Senate in its wisdom prevented the expected federal aid being given. We trust the federal grant may be made available in future years, so that the good work of improving our transportation in all lines may go on with accelerated speed next year and thereafter.

point is its superlative sensitiveness. The claim for it in that regard is that it will measure and record a change of one-thousandth part of a degree.

This thermometer is designed to be permanently attached to the ship under water and by wires leading from it to the chart room to make a continuous record of the temperature of the water for the instruction of the captain or officer in control of the ship. Prof. Barnes claims that it will infallibly detect the presence of an iceberg at a distance of two miles on the windward side of it, and seven miles on the leeward side. The instrument has been tried. It is claimed with complete success, on the Government steamers in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and the steamship Royal George, now on her outward voyage from Montreal is equipped with it. And Prof. Barnes is making the trip to test his invention for the first time in the broad Atlantic.

Great results for human safety on the seas are hoped for from the micro-thermometer. An iceberg as it melts gives off a current of cold water all around it, and this being fresh water and lighter than the salt water, spreads over the surface of the sea to a distance of two miles to windward and seven miles to leeward of the berg. An instrument so sensitive to a change of temperature as is the micro-thermometer, must detect this colder water. If the instrument shows the water becoming colder, the ship must be approaching the ice; if it shows the water becoming warmer the ship is leaving the ice behind. The world will doubtless hear more of Prof. Barnes and his invention before long.

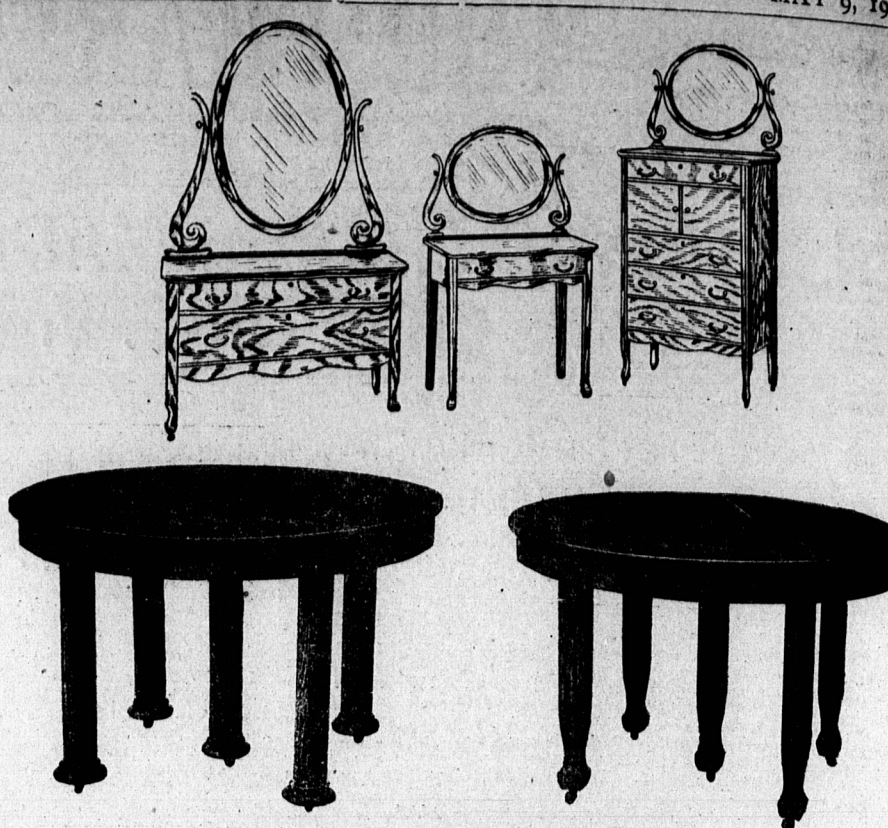

AN ICEBERG DETECTOR. Professor H. T. Barnes, Director of Physical Laboratories and McDonald Professor of Physics at McGill, is credited with a noteworthy invention which he calls a micro-thermometer. Its use will be the detection of the near presence of an iceberg from on board a ship at sea, especially in the night time. It has long been known that the water in the vicinity of a berg is colder than is the surrounding and more distant water. Prof. Barnes' micro-thermometer's strong

C. M. HAY'S REMAINS ARRIVE AT MONTREAL.

MONTREAL, May 8.—The mortal remains of Charles Melville Hay's head of the Grand Trunk Railway, and a prominent figure among the thousands of heroes of the Titanic disaster, arrived at the end of their long funeral journey this morning.

Exactly at the hour of 11 o'clock the private car "Canada," which many times during the late president's life conveyed him over the long miles of the track on various tours of inspection, shunted silently into Bonaventure station and came to a halt at the end of Track 4, where a purple and black draped platform awaited its arrival.

The removal of the body this morning was rendered necessary. The ceremony was brief yet impressive for the reason of its very simplicity. "Just a bare dozen of near friends of the late great railway head gathered at the station to receive the remains. A simple ceremony marked their reception. In absolute silence the draped locomotive noiselessly ran a private car near the funeral stage.

Time goes on, the hard-up captain of artillery has become a ruler of Europe, Napoleon the Great, Mme. Sans-Gene, a Duchess, but she never shone as a society lady. Napoleons sisters, who were only too glad to forget their humble origin took offence at her blunt outspoken manners, and complained bitterly. A little later Napoleon has an interview with her, and is greatly surprised when she produces his still unsettled washing bill and demands payment. Napoleon is amused by this awakening of old memories, and the couple become the best of friends.

At this time the Austrian Minister Count Neipperg, has paid the Empress such attentions that the suspicions have become aroused, the couple are found in a slightly compromising situation. A quarrel occurs, and Napoleon orders Neipperg shot at dawn. News of this reaches Mme. Sans-Gene, who convinced of Neipperg's innocence, she dies to intercede for him, with the Emperor, whom she convinces of the Counts innocence, and he is pardoned.

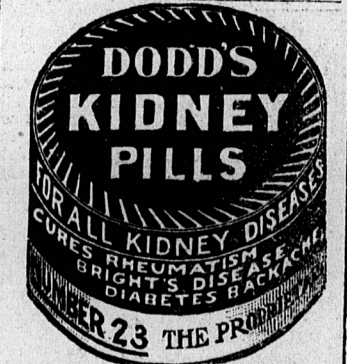

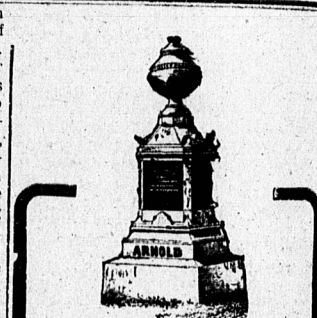
