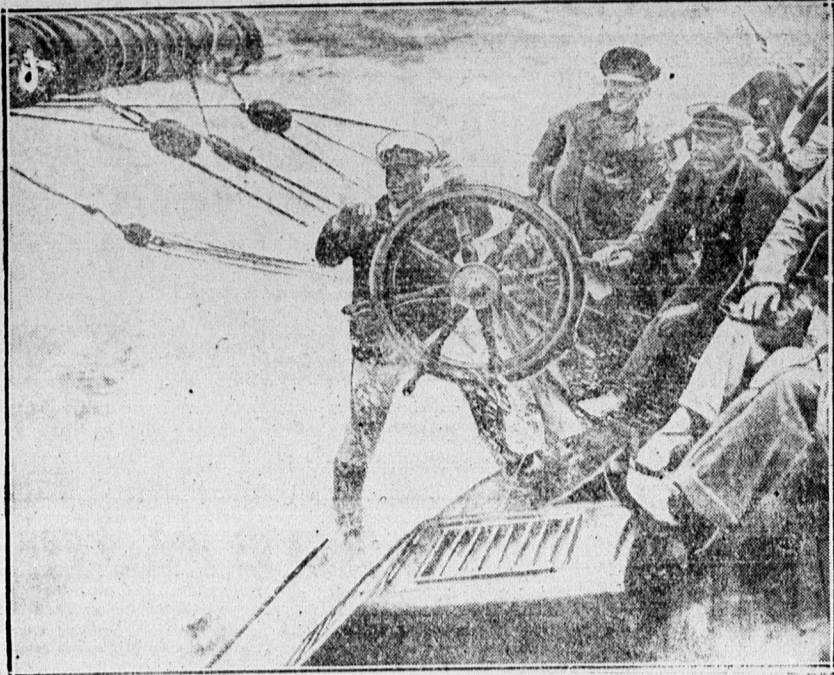

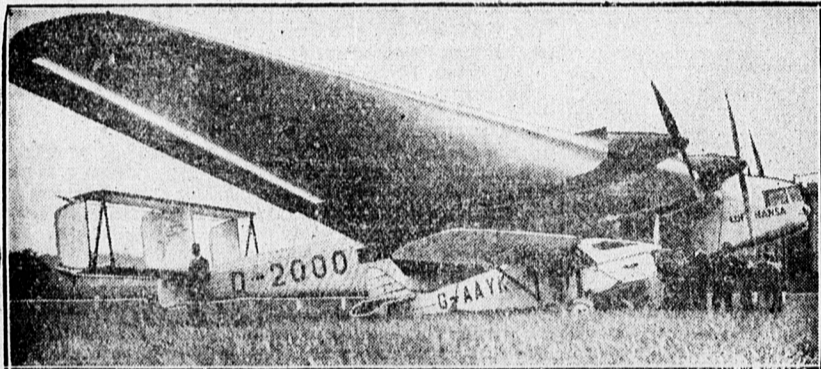
**CANADIAN PEER ATTENDS LINER FUNCTION**

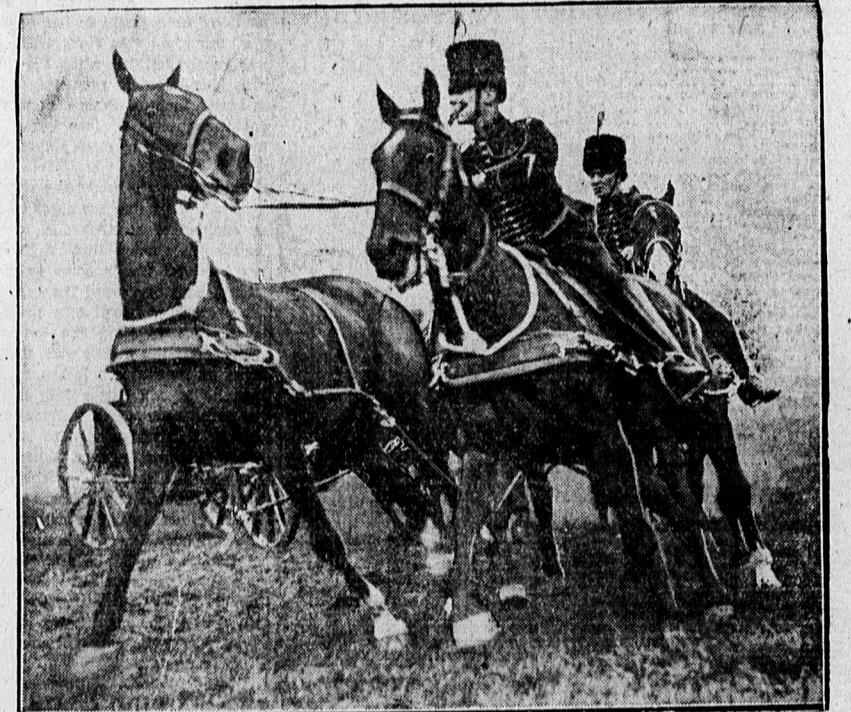
**THEIR MAJESTIES ATTEND CLASSIC RACE MEET**

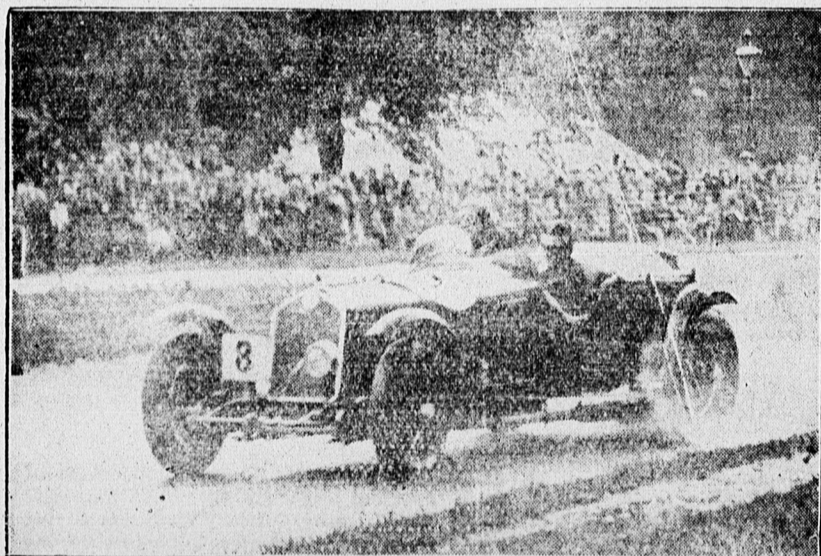
**LARGEST AND SMALLEST OF AEROPLANES AT CROYDEN**

**TAKE PART IN ENGLISH TATTOO**

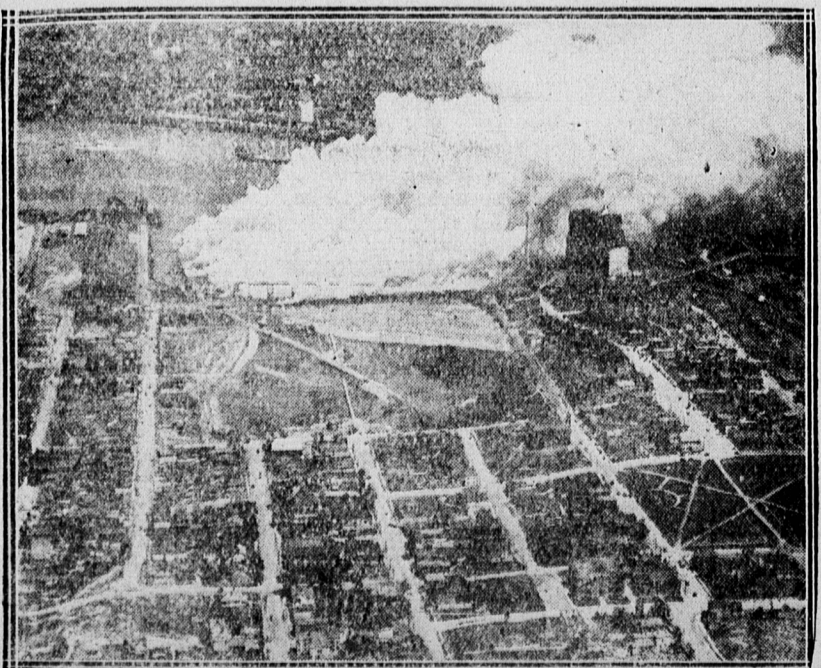

**HARBOR BLAZE THAT COST ST. JOHN \$10,000,000**

Here is a view of the fire which swept the western harbor front of St. John, N. B., a few days ago, causing damage estimated at \$10,000,000. Eleven docks and grain elevators, C. P. R., steamer Empress, immigration office, freight sheds, fertilizing plant, residence and water front host-ries, were razed in the path of the blaze, which is stated to have originated in a lighted cigarette butt. The fire raged for seven hours before being brought under control. There was no insurance on any of the dock property, valued at about \$4,000,000 and taken over years ago by the federal government.
