A LARGE number have taken advantage of the cheap fare to Halifax by the S. S. Halifax. She leaves the Plant line wharf at 1 o'clock today. The fare is cheap—good for 30 days.

THE S. S. Halifax sails at one o'clock today. A number of excursions will take passage by her to Halifax to attend the exhibition. 800 barrels of mackerel which were brought to the city yesterday; a car load of quabangs for the Philadelphia market form part of her cargo. The quabangs were brought to the city last night by the express from Ellerslie.
