The latest news, first of all.

J. R. McDonald and wife, Charlottetown, were registered at the Dufferin Hotel, St. John, Tuesday!

G. A. Ross, Fairville, N. B., a native of this City, took a prominent part in the S. S. Association which met in that city on Monday last.

The body of the seaman of the schooner E. B. Marvin, well-known in this Province, who was drowned at Beaver Narrows, near St. Peter's, on Wednesday last, was recovered on Saturday evening and interred at St. Peter's, C. B.

A public meeting was held in Sydney, C. B., this week to discuss the propriety and feasibility of organizing an athletic association and constructing a skating rink in Ward V section of the city. Among those on the Rink Committee appointed is L. Moffatt, a native of this Province.

The marriage is announced of Dr. Joseph MacAulay, of Tracadie, to Miss Francis Sullivan, of Boston. The wedding took place at Wintthrop, on Sunday, October 9th. A reception was given by the bride's father which took place at 128 Shirley street, Boston, where a very pleasant evening was spent. The bridal couple were attended by Miss Helen Sullivan, sister of the bride, and James MacAulay, brother of the groom. The bride looked very handsome. She was dressed in white Messaline. The happy couple left for Tracadie on Monday morning where they intend making a short stay.

At North Wiltshire, on the 9th ult., at the ripe age of eighty-nine years, Catharine, relict of the late Nicholas Bergigan. The deceased was born in the County of Wick, Ireland, and emigrated to this Province with her parents in the year 1829, settling at Tea Hill, where she resided until her marriage in 1833, when she became a resident of North Wiltshire, and has lived there ever since. Throughout her life she enjoyed robust health, never having required medical attendance until a year previous to her death. She was the mother of six children, three of whom died in infancy, whilst one son, Andrew, died about ten years ago, the survivors being Mrs. James Hughes, Kinross; Mrs. Peter Castello, New York; Mrs. Joseph Gardiner, Port Augustus; Mrs. James Curley, St. Ann's, Lot 65; Michael on the homestead, and P. J. Bergigan, Dundas. The late Mrs. Bergigan was noted for her deeply religious character, and was ever ready to contribute towards charitable objects. A kind and obliging neighbor, she was always present to render assistance in the hour of distress or bereavement in the community, and the high esteem in which she was held by all classes and creeds was attested by the large concourse of people who paid the last tribute of respect to her memory, her funeral being the largest ever seen at North Wiltshire. During her illness she was attended by Rev. Dr. Curran, P. P., and peacefully passed to her reward full of hope in a glorious immortality. Her funeral took place on Sunday the 10th ult., to St. Ann's, Lot 65, where the service for the dead was performed by the Rev. Father Gillis, of St. Dunstan's College, in the absence of the pastor. The pall-bearers were L. L. Jenkins, Michael O'Leary, Willam Bowman, William Cullen, George Clarke, John Clarkin, and her soul rest in peace.—Com.
