

St. Mary's Capture Jr. Hockey Title

Defeat Collegians 13-5 In Second Game To Keep Unbeaten Record Intact

The untied, unbeaten St. Mary's hockey team from Halifax last night at the Forum ended a two-year-old quest for the Maritime junior championship when they scaled the heights of hockey fame in these seaside provinces by defeating the Charlottetown Collegians in the second game of their two game total goal series 13-5. The win gave the Halifaxians the round 23-10.

The game hardly lived up to all its pre-game publicity but a record-breaking crowd saw the class St. Mary's performers out-play, out-skate and out-general the Collegians in a colorful, captivating contest that climaxed the climb of the teams to the Maritime junior finals.

While the game wrote fine to junior hockey here for another season, the Collegians, in defeat, strove desperately to stem the full force of the flood tide unleashed against them, but there was no denying the visitors who took full command of the situation after a sparkling first period.

The St. Mary's, in victory, proved as powerful a pack of puck-chasers as has come out of these parts in a decade to pursue the elusive goal of silverware, the Memorial Cup.

Gliffy Outstanding

While the St. Mary's squad was loaded with offensive power they had in the sensational Gliffy who proved the nemesis of the home team all night. Three goals were scored by him, after the time the Collegians broke through only to have the visiting net-custodian turn aside their every threat as he dived, sprawled and crawled to keep the rubber out.

The Collegians were unable to match the visitors in their short, snappy passing plays, but the defense stood up well, riding out the in-boring Halifaxians.

"I think the Government has given all worth-while positions in the Civil Service to returned men, and we will be only too willing to do anything we can; but to say that we are going to give them the preference in all labor and things like that is going too far. We have people here with families who have been laboring all their lives, and we have a great many positions in the Government that returned men will turn down because the salaries are too low.

Outlines Council Duties

Dr. MacMillan continued quoting Mr. Howe's statement as follows:

"Only the secretaries receive salaries. In order to coordinate the work of the various councils, there has been established with headquarters in Ottawa, the office of the co-ordinator of Regional Councils, in defining the functions of the Councils, account has also had to be taken of the very different problems of the various councils. (1) To assist the Dominion Department in the carrying out of the problems of reconstruction in their respective areas, and in keeping such information up to date.

I don't think we should hesitate for a moment to make some distinction between the men who came home with the scars of battle."
