F. McNevin, Long River, came to the city yesterday and left last evening on the special to Georgetown en route to Winnipeg.

Lester McLeod, Belfast, was a passenger on the mail special to Georgetown last night en route to Vancouver where he intends to locate.

The skating on the Hillsboro River and the harbor was reported good in spots yesterday. A number availed themselves of the opportunity for a skate on the harbor.

A Sackville Post of recent date says: On Prince Edward Island a total of 25,000 muskrats, 500 minks, 1,000 red foxes and a few weasels are killed each year. The black fox is bred there by people who keep their methods secret.

The following is taken from a Brockton, Mass. exchange: Nicholas Colwill of Kingston, P. E. I., has returned to his home after a few weeks' visit here with his nephew, W. George Colwill of 143 East Elm street. Mr. Colwill is a prosperous farmer and a large real estate holder in Kingston and while here paid visits to a number of friends and relatives in Tain, Providence, Mansfield and Fairhaven, where he was much pleased with the way the farming industry is carried on. He also was greatly impressed by the great shoe shops in this city.

Hon. Dr. Landry, New Brunswick, Commissioner of Agriculture, speaking in the Budget debate in the N. B. House of Assembly a few days ago pointed out that the value of agricultural products of New Brunswick had increased and that agriculture in that province was not in such a bad state as a previous speaker would have the country believe, and that there was not much wrong with New Brunswick as compared with the other Maritime Provinces; he pointed out that the Prince Edward Island returns showed an increase in the value of agricultural products of \$700,000 from 1901 when they were \$9,213,900 to \$9,988,100 in 1910, while in Scotia in the same period had dropped from \$22,319,300 to \$22,203,000, and New Brunswick had increased \$800,000—from 48,150,900 in 1901, to \$8,952,000 in 1910.

A New York paper contains the following:—Perhaps the crudest transportation line in the world is that in winter over the ice and water between Prince Edward Island and the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the mainland of New Brunswick, seven miles away. The government maintains the service and charges \$4 for inside passengers and \$2 for what are called strap passengers. The boats used are eighteen feet long, flat bottomed, shod with runners like the long island scooters, and provided with sails, oars, hooks and jols. You ride on the boat as far as you can and then you get out and help pull it over an ice floe and launch it in open water again; that is you do this if you are a strap passenger. Drifters frequently get wet to the hips and are extremely cold. Boats have sometimes been out in the straits for days and passengers have been made sick, killed or driven insane. When forced to spend all night on an ice floe, they burn up the second class mail matter to keep from freezing.

May has been unable to train his Tom Medium Junior because of the bad roads; but he will make it interesting for horsemen in the near future.

The regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held Monday evening at 7.30. Those present were: Judge Blanchard, Mr. James R. M. Johnson, Mr. Nash, Mr. Smith, J. Johnston. The teachers' report showed the enrollment for the past month to be 1068, the average attendance 927.24, the percentage 89, number of cases of tardiness 230, truants 6, number of visits to parents 135, number of notices 53, cases of corporal punishment 19, fell below average in grading 68, requests to leave school during session 145. The highest percentage made was 96, while fourteen teachers had a percentage of 90 and over. Two teachers reported no cases of tardiness and five teachers had only one.

The following were appointed visiting committee:—Mr. Johnson and T. C. James for Prince Street School, F. J. Nash and H. Smith for Queen Square, J. J. Johnston and Dr. Jenkins for West Kent. The usual routine business being transacted the meeting adjourned.

There peacefully passed away at her son Robert's residence at Pinette, on the eve of March 4th, 1911, Jessie, widow of the late Andrew Ross and second daughter of the late Robert and Mary McWilliams of Belfast, aged 81 years. Deceased leaves to mourn two sons—four daughters, viz: Robert, merchant at Pinette; William, on the homestead; Mrs. John H. Ross, Pt. Prim; Mrs. Wm. McLennan of Boston, Mrs. Wm. McWilliam of Surrey, and Sarah at home. She also leaves three brothers and one sister. Charles of Belfast, William of Pinette, Daniel of Mt. Stewart and Mrs. Dee of Boston, besides a large circle of relatives and friends. Deceased was in her usual good health until a few months ago, she was suddenly stricken with paralysis and despite all the loving and willing hands could do, death claimed her. The funeral which took place on Thursday, March 16th, to St. John's Cemetery, Belfast, was largely attended, and all that was mortal of a kind and loving mother was laid to rest beside that of her husband and four children. The funeral services at the house and grave were conducted by her pastor, Rev. Mr. McFadden.

**AT SACKVILLE**

SACKVILLE, N. B., April 2—A girl, about four years old, was found Friday morning on the door-step of the residence of John Snowden, not far from the Intercolonial Railway station.

The child was clad in a green coat, blue skirt and stocking cap. In one of its pockets was a note which read as follows: "I am a poor woman. Can't look after this child. Mrs. Gool."

The child was numb with cold and ate food ravenously. It is not known how long the little one had been on the door-step. One of its little boots was gone and it was afterwards discovered frozen in the mud a short distance from the Snowden house.

Enquiries have elicited the information that a man and woman and three small children got on the train at Baie Verte Friday night and came to Sackville. Harry McDonald, brakeman on the N. B. and P. E. I. Railway, has identified the child as being one which he helped off the train Friday night. It is reported that the people belong to Tain and that they took the train for Amherst Friday night about 8 o'clock.

The desertion of the child has produced a big sensation here and a large number visited Mr. Snowden's today to see the deserted one. The child could not talk, but seems to understand what is said to it. Marshal Sullivan is working on the case and it is hoped that the guilty parents will be brought to justice.

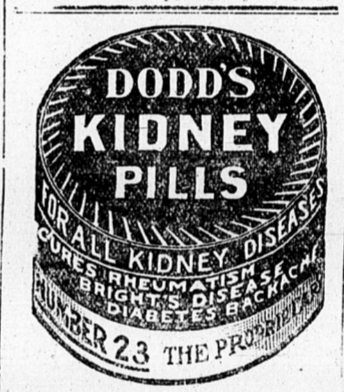

**WORK ON THE VETO NOW IN COMMITTEE.**

LONDON, April 4—Work on the Veto Bill designed to restrict the powers of Legislation of the House of Lords was yesterday resumed with the opening of the committee stage in the House of Commons.

The debate will be long and keen. Already over 1,000 amendments occupying seventy-four printed pages have been prepared.

It is the avowed intention of the Government to send the measure to the Upper Chamber by the middle of May; but veteran members of Parliament doubt the possibility of this.
