# Has Five Seconds Lead Over Grant Burnell

HALIFAX, Oct. 31. — Over 3000 cheering spectators greeted Owen Sawlor, champion walker of Dartmouth on Saturday afternoon, as he spurted desperately to the tape, twelve yards ahead of Grant Burnell, champion of Newfoundland, after staging one of the closest and hardest races ever held over the long course, to win the annual Halifax Herald and the Evening Mail 25-mile walking race. His time was 3:56.38 and 45 seconds, a new record.

It was a wonderful exhibition of walking on the part of both Sawlor and Burnell, as well as the 29 other competitors who completed the long walk. Burnell set the pace practically all the way, with Sawlor dogging his footsteps. Stallard favored to force the leaders all the way, was killed off by the terrific pace, and had to drop out of the race at Bedford. The feature of the race was the fine walking of the newcomers, Frederick Duggan and Charlie Bagley. The former walker, wearing the colors of the St. Joseph's club, stayed behind in the early stages of the race, but on reaching Bedford made his big bid for honors. He caught the leaders, Burnell and Sawlor, at Birch Cove, and the three walked shoulder to shoulder into the last half mile. Here Sawlor commenced his big sprint for the finish, Burnell following close behind, and Duggan dropped back.

# St. F. X. Is Defeated By N. Glasgow

ANTIGONISH, Oct. 31. — Crossing their opponents' line for three tries in the initial period of this afternoon's game in The Halifax Herald and The Evening Mail senior interscholastic rugby series, New Glasgow Academy defeated St. Francis Xavier Academy 9-0. The contest was played on a muddy field dotted with puddles, and good football was out of the question.

New Glasgow took the over-confident Xavierians completely by surprise in the first period and clearly outplayed them. John Allan scored the first try from a mixup near the Xavier line. Murray Scott followed with the next one under almost identical circumstances. For a brief period the Xavierians were a menace and the visitors were forced to touch for safety. Before the intermission Bill Buck grabbed the ball from a mixup near the St. F. X. chalk mark and crossed the line for the third try.

# Scoreless in Second

The Xavierians tried desperately to turn defeat into victory in the last period and succeeded in holding the visitors scoreless. It was not until five minutes before the final whistle however, that the Xavierians got going properly. They threw their full weight into an eleventh hour assault, depending largely on dribbling. Five or six times the ball was almost carried over the line or just over it from mixups near the New Glasgow chalk mark. Each time the ball was buried beneath a scrambling heap of mud-covered youths, but none of the several attempts resulted in a try.
