SAYS BERESFORD GAVE WRONG ORDER

LONDON, July 8.—The Times this morning publishes a statement to the effect that during the recent maneuvers of the channel fleet, Admiral Lord Beresford gave the signal for an evolution which, if obeyed, would have brought the cruisers Argyll and Good Hope into collision. Sir Percy Scott, however, on board the Good Hope, the statement says, doubted the accuracy of the signal and refrained from obeying it. The story is alluded to in other London newspapers, but it is not verified, and appears to be a part of the campaign against Lord Beresford arising out of his feud with Sir Percy Scott.

BOY WAS KILLED IN A HAY FIELD

WATERTOWN, N. Y., July 5.—Franklin Shaw 17 years, of Schenectady, N. Y., son of Henry Shaw, was instantly killed near here yesterday, a charge of buckshot tearing away his breast. The boy was raking hay and had with him a shot gun to kill woodchucks. The gun slipped and exploded.

ARMED INDIANS MAY ATTACK WHITE

WELETKA, Okla., July 8.—Three wagon loads of rifles were taken in to camp of the Snake Indians yesterday and several hundred of the two thousand Indians congregated there heavily armed. The Indians are making a new demand, according to reports, one distinctly different from anything heretofore broached. The demand is that the Snakes begin their allotment of certificates which they have heretofore steadfastly refused. It is said that "Crazy Snake" issued an ultimatum yesterday in which he said that unless the certificates were delivered today, the Indians would make a charge upon the whites as their initial step, of driving all the white people from the former Indian nation.

GREAT BRITAIN EASY WITH SHIPS

LONDON, July 8.—A special dispatch to the Times from Wellington, N. Z., notes the disappointment that is felt there because only three vessels of the Australian squadron will participate in the welcome to the American fleet. It adds that Commander Crutchev, secretary of the Navy League, states that he does not view the visit with pleasure because Great Britain ought to receive the Americans with an equal force of warships, otherwise the comparison will be to Great Britain's disadvantage.

EXCITEMENT AT TOWN OF COBALT

COBALT, July 8.—Much excitement and consternation was caused here on Saturday among "Blind Pig" owners and frequenters, when officials of the Government, apparently after careful preparation, made a great sweep and executed fifty warrants. Nearly a dozen men were taken to the police station, and while some obtained bail, others had to remain in custody. The cases will be tried today.

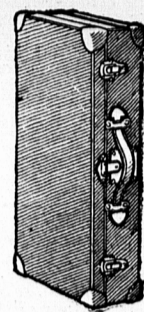

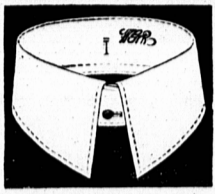
