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THE HOCKEY LEAGUE SERIES ENDS WITH ALL SENIOR TEAMS EQUAL

The Victorias Win Last Night's Game From the Crystal-Pioneers by Six Goals to Four

WITH LARGEST CROWD OF SEASON IN ATTENDANCE

The Senior Game Was an Exhibition of the Fastest Hockey of the Winter—The Excitement Was Intense Throughout—To Decide the Tie Two Teams Will Play and the Winners Meet the Third.

The largest crowd of the season saw the Victorias defeat the Crystal-Pioneers by six goals to four in the last Hockey game of the League series in Hillsboro Rink last night. The result came as a surprise to followers of the game. Even the Victorias' most ardent supporters were agree-



ably disappointed by the stubborn fight their team put up. On paper it certainly looked like a sure win for the Westerners; they had defeated both Charlottetown aggregations by amazing scores, and it was natural to suppose that last night's game was surely theirs. If they won, the trophy would go to Summerside and since the Abegweit's crushing defeat, visions of silver cups appeared to many wearers of the green and red. But it was not to be, at least for a time. The trophy is yet in Charlottetown; the teams are all equal, and a play-off is now unnecessary.

Changes had been made on both teams since their last appearance on Charlottetown ice. "Rosey" Baker and Roy Holman appeared on the forward line of the C. P.'s. The former on the wing played a good game, his side shots being particularly effective; Holman at centre was also a source of strength. The Victorias placed Drake at Cover Point and F. Gaudet formerly point in the section at Point. Drake played a remarkably good game in his position, but behind him several disastrous mistakes were made which resulted on one occasion in a score; but on the whole Gaudet was rarely caught napping.

The Victorias won the game by superior combination, persistent attack and sure shots on goal. Summerside's forwards did good individual work, but their attempts at combination invariably came to grief in contact with Drake. Were it not for the marvellous work of Williams in goal, the score against them would have been larger. He stopped a number of difficult shots; that looked like sure scores.

There was an annoying delay of half an hour before Referee L. B. Macmillan called the teams together. At the outset the C-P's were aggressive; the Victorias were hard pressed and two goals were quickly scored against them. They gradually turned the tables

ROCKEFELLER GIVES HIS DEFINITION

Of what he Considers Philanthropy to be

BEFORE SUNDAY CLASS

Spiritual Riches are of More Benefit to Men More Than Wealth or Genius is.

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., defined philanthropy before the members of his Bible class in New York last Sunday from a Rockefeller point of view.

He took the ground that it was not Christian philanthropy to give alms to a beggar on the street; that such an act tended to increase the number of beggars and tramps, and that true and pure philanthropy consisted in extending sympathy and encouragement.

It was to the Young Men's Bible Class of the Fifth Avenue Baptist church that young Mr. Rockefeller expounded his ideas. In the course of our lessons on the life of the Apostles," he began, we have reached that part where Peter performed the miracle of curing the lame man.

The man whom Peter cured had probably been born lame. We learn that it was the custom of his friends to carry him into the door of the temple, where the people entering to worship would toss him a coin. Peter saw him and said, "Silver and gold I have not, but what I have I give to thee." Then he took him by the hand and bade him rise, and the cripple arose and went into the Temple rejoicing.

"The giving of money is not true philanthropy. I know a friend who always gives a quarter to a beggar who accosts him on the street. I asked him once why he did so, and he replied that it always reminded him of the time when he did not have a quarter and how big one seemed to him. Others are prompted to give a beggar money in order to get rid of them quickly. That is not true philanthropy. It simply increases the great army of beggars and tramps, and nine times out of ten the beggar is not desisting and simply adopts this method of obtaining money in preference to working for a living.

"Now, men, what is philanthropy? Won't some of you express your ideas on it?" There were several responses. One said "Kindness," another "Doing good to others a third, "Sympathy."

"That is it," cried Mr. Rockefeller, vehemently. "Sympathy! Real sympathy and encouragement!" "The person who really needs help is not the one who accosts you on the street. The poor who are actually suffering do not parade it. Their condition is not only found out by their next door neighbor—like a case that came to my attention this week. "A poor woman was sick and her children were hungry. They had no food for over a day, when the person living on the floor above learned of their condition. "The personal help, the kind words of sympathy, the readiness to sacrifice time, thought, strength affection—this was worth more than the few pence expended, and is the most important element in true philanthropy. "I tell you men, when you are down in the mouth, discouraged, crushed, money is not the great aid. A kind hand to help you up, a heart beating next to yours, a sympathy—a feeling that some one has an interest in you—will do more to get you on your feet to continue the struggle. "I tell you what the deserving poor most need is not money but a friend. Every one of you can be friendly to some poor soul. The Apostles did not have money to give, but they gave such as they had. "True philanthropy is never the subject of vulgar parade," continued Mr. Rockefeller. "Let us not judge what prompts a man to do this or that but let us just go ahead and try to do the very best we can. "Let us all be philanthropists in our own way this week, and extend a helping hand and sympathy to some poor fellow who needs it. "Spiritual riches benefit men more than

Shouts of "Long Live Leo!"—Bishop Dead—Hotel Fire and Fifteen Burned to Death.

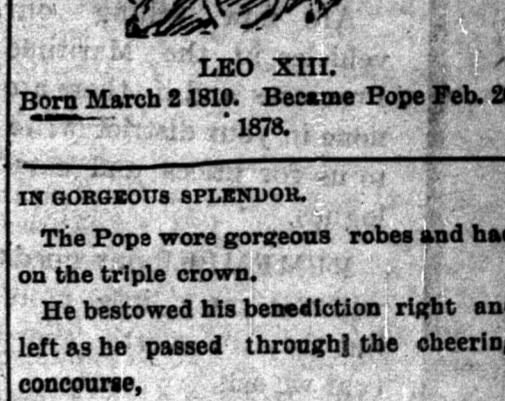
THE PAPAL JUBILEE ENDED.
