NEW YORK, Sept. 23-(AP)- Industrial stocks, buoyed by growing confidence spending and slightly lessening war tension, today swung into one of the best advances in nearly two months.
Bell Telephone advanced 2 1-4 points to 108. Lesser gains were registered by Dome Mines, International Nickel, Walkers and Ford. Distillers and Lake Shore Mines were easy.
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks held a net gain of 9 of a point at 45.3. The day's rise equalled that of Sept. 4, which was the largest since July 30.
Despite slow-down as profits were cashed here and there, transfers aggregated 982,250 shares, largest since Sept. 5, and comparing with 380,550 last Friday.
Prominent on the upside were U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, General Motors, J. I. Case, International Harvester, Douglas Aircraft, Westinghouse, General Electric, Allied Chemical, Dow Chemical, Eastman Kodak, Anaconda, Kennecott, American Smelting, Great Northern Pennsylvania, N. Y. Central and Pullman.
Senior shares, many of which have sizable accrued unpaid dividends, reflected the belief that industrial expansion would enable companies to clear up some of the accumulations. Among wide preferred movers were issues of Pittsburg Steel, Olin Steel, General Steel Castings, Revere Copper & Brass, American Woolen, Jones & Laughlin, Budd Mfg., Certain-Tied, and American Locomotive.

Mayors Have Stormy Air Trip From N. Y.

OTTAWA, Sept. 22-(CP)- Nine Canadian mayors landed at Uplands Airport here Saturday after a stormy airplane trip from New York where they attended the United States conference of mayors. Mayor Stanley Lewis of Ottawa said what impressed him greatly was "the fine spirit of cooperation between the United States government and the mayors of the country."
The other eight mayors who made the trip, were Andrew Davison, Calgary; John Queen, Winnipeg; Ralph C. Day, Toronto; Walter Merrill, Westmount, Que.; T. D. Bouchard, St. Hyacinthe, Que.; W. E. Donovan, Halifax; and Edouard Hamelin, pro-mayor of Montreal.

OLDEST SHIPYARD IS GOING STRONG

Soldier Makes Illegal Entry Into Maine

GREENOCK, Scotland-(CP)- The world's oldest shipyard, which has been building vessels in this northern Scottish port since 1711, is working at full pressure building merchant vessels and warships.
The firm is Scott's Shipbuilding and Engineering Company and still is controlled by the same family which founded it 229 years ago. The present directors are C. C. Scott and C. L. Scott.
In its early years the shipyard turned out small fishing and coasting vessels and the firm's first large square-rigged sailing ship was launched in 1763, six years after Britain captured Canada from the French.
Scott's was among the first to build the fast Indo-China clipper and was one of the steamship pioneers in three successive years, 1815-20-21, the largest steamships in the country were "cut into the water" by the year. The firm built its last wooden vessel in 1839.
Its first naval contract was undertaken in 1803 when the warship Prince of Wales was built.
PENNIES FOR WAR VICTIMS
Philadelphia, Pa. Sept. 15-(AP)- For the purpose of helping ex-servicemen children arriving from England, three New York girls collected a total of twelve hundred United States pennies which were given to Malcolm J. Woods, Canadian National Railways passenger representative in Philadelphia for delivery to the Canadian Red Cross. One of the girls said they were "that pennies the outcome of prayer and meditation, please use them for some little girl coming to Canada."

Polish Artist's 'Love' For Nazis Told in His Cartoons



Arthur Szyk, famed Polish artist who is probably the world's finest illuminator, has no high opinion of the Nazis who destroyed his homeland and decimated its population. His feeling is expressed in this cartoon of a German soldier, which he calls "The Babykiller" (LEFT). "Wherever there is a fight against Germans you can count on me," says Szyk. In the last war the distinguished artist fought against Germans in the army ranks. This time he fights with cartoons; he has been doing them for British propaganda authorities. He is in Toronto to do an illuminated history of Canada. This cartoon (RIGHT), showing German prisoners trudging under escort to an internment camp, is entitled "Tourists" - a caustic jibe at Nazi dreams of world conquest.
