Potatoes Are Moving In Volume

(Special to the Guardian)
MONCTON, N. B., April 11—Business is looking up on P. E. I. and potatoes are moving in volume chiefly to Ontario points, stated P. W. Clarkin, District Freight and Passenger Agent, Canadian National Railways, Charlottetown, P. E. I., who was in Moncton today on railway business. It is estimated that approximately \$3,000,000 have been brought to P. E. I. through the sale of fox pelts during the past season (1932-33) he said. Mr. Clarkin continued, "prices received for pelts during the past season were higher than for a couple of seasons past, the greater proportion being disposed of through European markets. In addition pelts were disposed of through Montreal and New York markets."
With regard to the tourist trade Mr. Clarkin remarked that Prince Edward Island expects to receive a greater number of tourists this year than last. Increased efforts are being made to attract tourists to the Garden of the Gulf. Facilities for handling tourists have never been better he went on to say, what with the new Canadian National Railways hotel at Charlottetown, the Canadian National, and the new modern oilburning steam ferry which connects the Island and the mainland and carries passengers and motor cars across the Strait of Northumberland from Cape Tormentine, N. B., to Borden, P. E. I.

Petawawa Camp To Help Jobless

OTTAWA, April 11—Food, clothing, shelter and 20 cents a day will be provided for 1,000 single, homeless men this Summer in a construction camp which the Department of National Defence will open within the next month at Petawawa.
Lieut.-Col. C. B. Russell of London will be in charge of the camp. It was announced to-night by Major-General A. G. L. McNaughton, chief of staff.
According to General McNaughton, the men will be drawn from the Pembroke and Upper Ottawa Valley areas. Latest of some 30 such projects to be initiated, the organization of this camp will be followed by others of a similar nature to be announced soon, he said.
After first building temporary quarters for themselves, the men will be set at the construction of an airplane landing field and later or army buildings to be used in connection with the field.

Shipping Bill May Be Held This Session
OTTAWA, April 11—(C.P.)—The new shipping bill with its 821 clauses and many hundred sub clauses designed to regulate and govern "British ships of Canadian register" to the ends of the earth today ran into trouble with constitutional law. So serious were the dangers outlined to the Senate Shipping Committee by W. F. O'Connor that the Committee which has struggled with the mammoth Bill sitting after sitting, decided to call it a day and leave a sub-committee to reach a decision as to the advisability of going ahead with the bill this session.
It was made clear, however, by Senator Arthur Meighen, Government leader in the Senate, that even if the Bill were shelved it would still be possible to give the Canadian Shipping interests in the inland waters, particularly the Great Lakes, the relief they have sought for several years. They want to exclude foreign ships from any part of the coastal trade of Canada within these waters. What the shipping interests desire most is that the transportation of grain from the head of the lakes to Montreal be reserved exclusively for Canadian ships.

This Deepsea Fish Carries Electric Light
LOS ANGELES, April 11—Discovery of gigantic fish hitherto unknown to science, which were photographed by remote control cameras five miles deep in the Caribbean Sea, was reported today by Leon F. D'Arboreaux, San Francisco scientist, returning from a year's research with the Johnson-Smithsonian expedition into the Porto Rico deep.
Douglas would not divulge details of what he said would be "startling scientific disclosures" of submarine life, obtained by flashlight photography at depths ranging from 20,000 to 26,000 feet.
"These monster fishes we photographed are all equipped with their own lighting systems, and they live in absolute darkness five miles below the surface," said Mr. D'Arboreaux. "One little fellow we captured had a long barb beneath his chin on one end of which was a perfect tiny electric light globe."
