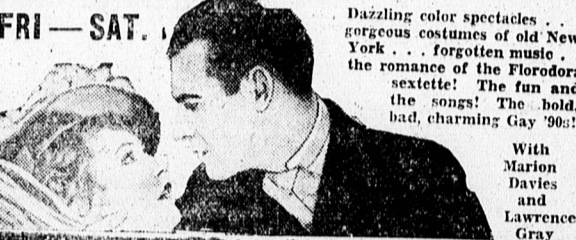

Text Of Statement By Premier Bennett

Economic Independence Asserted In Vigorous Statement Covering Imperial Conference Issue.

(Continued from Page 1)

crystallize the terms of my proposal and to provide a definite basis for discussion, I made a concrete offer for reciprocal, and what I believe to be mutually advantageous tariff preferences.

"At the time I was careful to point out the need of a certain flexibility in the matter of tariff and I said that the unit of preference suggested would necessarily be modified or increased in relation to different classes of commodities. On many other occasions I have made clear my views on this point.

"The principle of preferential tariffs has been approved by all the overseas Dominions and among them there was a common eagerness to canvass their detailed application. But we did not wilfully shut our eyes to any conceivable meritorious alternative. Indeed, I have declared on several occasions my willingness to favorably consider a quota system as a competitive method to that of tariffs for securing a preferred position for Empire wheat in the United Kingdom.

No Proposals

"The principle of preferential tariffs was neither approved nor categorically disapproved by delegates of the United Kingdom in the Imperial Conference, nor was there offered by them any definite alternative to the general scheme endorsed by the Dominions. The quota system was carefully considered by the committee on economic cooperation but despite the favorable views which such enquiry developed no proposal of a quota on Empire wheat was made by the Government of the United Kingdom.

there can never come a concrete and stable agreement. He had condemned it despite the resolutions which were passed, despite the statement of policy of his Government, despite the fact that during the whole period of the Conference neither the principle of tariff preferences nor my plans to make them operative were discussed. And it had condemned it without offering a single positive proposal which might be reviewed as an alternative to mine.

Genuine Regret

"I have said it is with genuine regret that I refer to this statement of the Secretary of State for the Dominion. But, in justice to my own country and in justice to the great cause of closer economic unity, there is no other course open. For if this statement indicates what is to be the attitude of the United Kingdom at the conference to be held in Ottawa within the next 12 months then I have little hope that any agreement which Canada may reach with the other overseas Dominions will include the United Kingdom. Holding these views it is but right that I should express them. Time is running against us, Canada, in her own interest and in the interests of the commonwealth, is honestly working for close economic association. But if her proposal is to be thus contemptuously rejected Canadians can only accept the rejection and act accordingly by embracing other means at hand of further strengthening her economic position in the world."

MAPS INACCURATE REPORT AVIATORS

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 2.—Marked discrepancies in maps of certain Newfoundland districts as compared with the actual topography of the country were reported on their arrival here by Arthur Fraser and Douglas Sullivan, who flew from Toronto to St. John's in November with a moth plane for the Newfoundland Airways.

After six days at Stephenville Crossing, in the district of Port au Port on the West Coast, where they were retarded by bad weather, the flyers got away for the flight across the interior. Shortly after leaving Bay St. George, the plane crossed the Hare Hills at an altitude of 6,000 feet by their instruments, and although the range is shown to be 2,000

\$75,000 Given For Public Health Work

The following telegram was received yesterday by Dr. P. A. Creelman, Provincial Health Officer:

Ottawa, Dec. 2nd. "Have received \$75,000, our gift to your five year programme."

"R. E. WODEHOUSE Sec'y. of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association.

This means that \$15,000 a year will be given through the above Association to Prince Edward Island for public health work in this province. The conditions of this gift required that all the health activities in this province would be united under one organization, namely: The Provincial Board of Health. The Red Cross Society and the Provincial Government have already agreed to these conditions.

The moneys which are at present being expended in this province for public health purposes amount to approximately \$13,600 per year. The two grants combined will give the Island an annual budget purely for the above purposes of \$28,600.

1930, the provinces had loaded 10,563,132 tons of revenue freight as compared with 7,825,337 tons in the year immediately preceding the Maritime Freight Rates Act, which came into effect July 1, 1927. This record loading had been made in the face of declines in other sections.

It was estimated that the adjustments in the cost of railway service in the Maritimes had saved to Maritime shippers over \$4,000,000 per year.

Maritime Board Of Trade Meeting

Since September 30, Mr. Saunders' report said, the Transportation Commission, through lack of funds, has been obliged to refuse new cases.

Coal Transport Charges

The Commission had held a watching brief on the Board of Railway Commissioners' investigation into the cost of moving coal from the Maritime Provinces to Central Canada on the basis of cost.

Importance to P. E. Island

The importance of Prince Edward Island of following up the case for re-adjustment of rates for transporting automobiles via car ferry was pointed out. A ruling has been obtained, but not carried out, and application for an order had been filed.

It was also urged that the matter of import rates under the Maritime Freight Rates Act, a feature of the Duncan Report as yet unimplemented, be carried to its ultimate conclusion.

Carriers had refused the basis of rates suggested by shippers for potatoes moving from Maritime to other points in Canada, and a recommendation had been made that the matter be carried to the Board of Railway Commissioners, but owing to lack of funds the commission were unable to proceed.

Mr. Cornell urged that general freight rates on the D. A. R. and Halifax and Southwestern be thoroughly studied, holding there was ample room for readjustment of rates, and recommended that an extensive investigation of express rates affecting the Maritime Provinces be carried out.
