Maritime Baptist Women's Missionary Union In Session

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Aug. 26.—(CP)—Presentation of a life membership in the United Baptist Women's Missionary Union of the Maritime Provinces was made to Mrs. W. G. Clark, Fredericton, wife of New Brunswick's Lieutenant-Governor, at last night's session of the Union's 33rd annual convention. Dr. J.B. McLaurin, Toronto, general secretary of the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board, said in an address that continued missionary endeavor was necessary in time of war. He referred to the war's devastating effect on foreign missions and paid tribute to Great Britain for assuming responsibility for some missions which otherwise could not carry on.

U. S. To Turn Out 7,000 Pilots Annually

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(CP)—As a major feature of the preparedness drive, the United States is swiftly developing an air training plan to turn out 7,000 pilots a year for the Army Air Corps. The scheme is somewhat similar to the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan and it was intimated in official military circles here that the two plans could be coordinated if the necessary arose.

—NEW AIR RAID ALARMS USED IN BRITAIN.—LONDON, Aug. 30.—(CP)—New air raid warning tactics were in effect today in an effort to save Londoners' sleep and reduce the number of false alarms which send armament workers into shelters and disrupt production each time an enemy bomber nears.

—\$50,000 TAKEN FROM AIRWAYS STRONG BOX.—PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Aug. 29.—(CP Cable)—Theft of \$50,000 in newly-mined gold from a strong box in Pan American Airways' quarters here was reported to police today.

—SEES ROOSEVELT STRONG OPPONENT TO NAZI AIMS.—DES MOINES, Ia., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace tonight called upon the voters of the United States to curb Hitler's "desires against the progress of the world" by electing President Roosevelt.

—NOT MODERN WEAPON.—MELBOURNE.—(CP)—An archer brought a long bow and a half a dozen arrows to the police for a ruling whether they should be registered as instruments of war. The answer was no.

—MACHINE TOOL CONTROLLER.—Thomas Arnold, of Montreal, who has been appointed Canadian machine-tool controller by the federal department of munitions, Mr. Arnold is president of the Citadel Merchandizing Corp., Ltd., a government owned company, whose business it is to increase the supply of machine tools available for this country. He is also chairman of the Manitoba Steel Foundries, Ltd., and of Commercial Alcohols Ltd. He is president of Taylor and Arnold, Ltd. and a director of Algoma Steel Corp., Ltd. Mr. Arnold was born in Scotland in 1881 and came to this country when he was six years old.

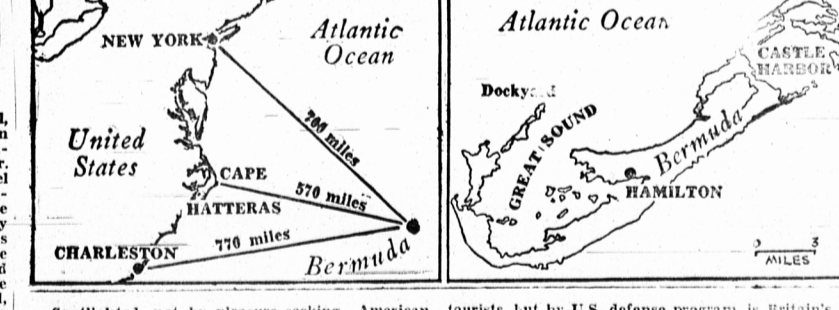
