The concrete and plastering was done by Mr. Henry Ford, Glasgow Road. Electric wiring by Mr. W. Walker, Charlottetown, Plumbing by Mr. H. Henry, Charlottetown and painting by Mr. Russell McNeil, Hunter River, all first-class workmen. The exterior has a lovely appearance and Mr. Nov is to be congratulated on the great addition he made in Hunter River this summer and his friends in Hunter River and surrounding districts join in wishing Mr. Nov every success in his new hotel.

Maritime Religious Educational Council

Many church schools this year in celebrating the Christmas season used pageantry in their special programmes. The "Light of the World" a pageant depicting the progress of Christianity from Bethlehem to farthest part of the world was given by several schools. An impressive service "White Gifts for the King" was carried out by a still larger number, while reports from other sources tell of the "Nativity," the "Adoration," both pageants of beauty and effectively telling the Christmas message.

Throughout our Provinces during these last two weeks, the hundreds of elementary teachers have been busy and happy in planning some special holiday feature for the joy of the little ones in the Sunday Schools. Many and varied have been the entertainments, the Christmas trees and the children's parties. In all these has been a tendency to greater simplicity in entertainment and a stronger purpose to give the Christmas time a proper significance in the life of the child, so that he may take the real meaning of Christmas into his life. "Training for Leadership" is one of the slogans in Christmas work-to-day. This is being made possible in many ways one being the short courses in Religious Education offered by several leading universities. The winter short course of four to six weeks is attractively arranged, full of the best instruction and the financial side kept as low as possible. An award of \$25.00 was announced for the best design to be used by the World's Sunday School Association in advertising the Ninth Convention of that Association which will be held in Glasgow, Scotland, June 18-26, 1924. Approximately 120 designs of Convention slogans were submitted. These were carefully examined by a special committee named by the Executive Committee of the World's Sunday School Convention. The design chosen has an open Bible in the centre which is encircled by the words "Ninth World's Sunday School Convention, Glasgow, 1923." Scotch thistles form the background. The Bible rests on the Scotch cross. It may be that the Convention Badge will be of the same design. The three ships which will take the delegates across just in time for the Convention will sail on June 7 from the ports of Montreal, Philadelphia and New York. The entire cabin space on these three boats will be for the Sunday school pilgrims. Both before and after the Convention, tours will include Balestine and Egypt. Arrangements are being made to take 2,000 from the United States and Canada and a like number will come from the rest of the world.
