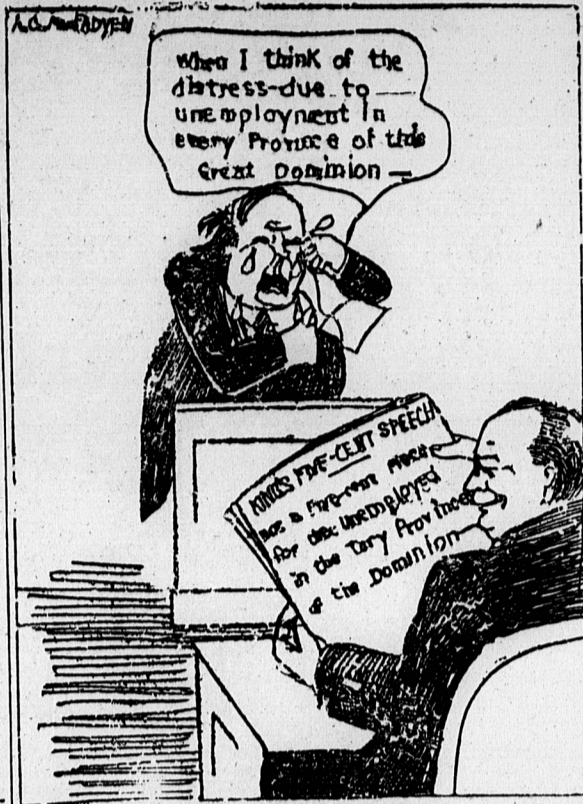
Lea Government Appointments Cause Considerable Heart- Burning In Liberal Quarters.

THE BAPTIST CONVENTION AT BEDEQUE United States And France Reach Accord

CLOSING MEETINGS OF SIXTY-FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING OF BAPTIST ASSOCIATION LARGELY ATTENDED

The attendance was so large at the evening service of the Baptist Association at Bedeque on Sunday that the overflow from the Church had to be accommodated in the community hall adjoining. Rev. Dr. Vincent being the speaker there, who preached an eloquent sermon from the 42nd Psalm, and from the words, "He that cometh unto me." The church was filled to capacity each day since the meetings, which were most inspiring and helpful, have been in session. On Sunday morning the devotion services were conducted by Rev. R. W. Lindsay. The men's choir of Bedeque Church led in the song of praise. A solo by the little daughter of Rev. Mr. Lindsay was a pleasing feature of the service.

Two Nations Found It Difficult To See Eye To Eye Regarding The Hoover Moratorium

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 6.—An accord between the United States and France on the one year moratorium on inter-governmental debt payments, was announced today by President Hoover. PARIS, July 6.—Statesmen representing the Governments of France and the United States drew up and initialed tonight, in the red drawing room of the Ministry of the Interior, a protocol which, it is hoped, will assure the success of President Hoover's plan for aiding Germany and rehabilitating the financial structure of the entire world. The fact that an agreement between the two nations had been reached on the Hoover reparations moratorium proposal was announced following a brief conference which began at 9.55 p.m. At the close of the conference Premier Laval read a communique in which it was stated that the French text of an accord, formulated at a Cabinet session this afternoon, had received the approval of Washington. The text had been telephoned earlier in the evening to Washington by Secretary Mellon and Ambassador Edge. The triumph came after days of anxiety during which the two nations found it difficult to see eye to eye.

Red Cross At Disposal Of The Government

OTTAWA, Ont., July 6.—The Canadian Red Cross society today placed its dominion wide organization at the disposal of the Federal Government to be used in helping to alleviate the serious conditions existing in the West due to drought. Norman Somerville, K. C., chairman of the Central Council of the Red Cross in Canada, and Dr. J. L. Biggar, National Commission, conferred with Premier R. B. Bennett in regard to what has been officially described as "the national emergency" resulting from poor growing conditions experienced this season in the West. The part the Red Cross might take in such relief measures as are instituted was the subject under discussion.

Will Establish The Office Of Comptroller

OTTAWA, Ont., July 6.—Without a dissenting voice the House of Commons today passed a Government bill to strengthen and consolidate the accounting control over federal revenues and expenditures. Sponsored by Premier R. B. Bennett, the bill passed almost as quickly as the Deputy Speaker read the individual clauses and sections. Among other things, the bill would establish the office of Comptroller of the Treasury. He would have close control over all expenditures made by all departments of the Government and his approval would be necessary before any expenditure might be made. Up to the present time, expenditure largely has been under the control of each department. The bill also consolidated and amended in certain respects the statutes governing the office of the Auditor-General. Maximum terms of imprisonment were increased from one to five years for breaches of trust, forgery or malfeasance, in connection with public money.

All Is Quiet In British House Changes May Be Made In Bill

LONDON, July 6.—The House of Commons was packed this afternoon for the sequel to the famous battle of Thursday, when John McGovern, Labor member for a Glasgow seat, was carried out fighting and the Chamber was adjourned in grave disorder. Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald had given notice of a motion to take appropriate steps against the Labor man who had assisted McGovern in his resistance to expulsion. But it all ended in apologies and quieted hour ended. James Maxton, leader of the Independent Labor Party, Labor's left wing, in graceful phrase expressed regret he had allowed himself to be influenced by his feelings and the circumstances of the moment and to act in a manner "which in calmer reason I know to be indefensible." Maxton's apology was followed by apologies from J. Beckett, Peckham; G. Buchanan, Gorbals; and J. Kinley, Bootle. Instead of moving "appropriate steps" the Prime Minister suggested the apologies should be accepted. He referred to Mr. Maxton's apology as "beautifully sincere and frank," but he thought Mr. Beckett's might have been a little more thorough and wholehearted. Beckett then added a word of further apology in which he associated himself entirely with Mr. Maxton. Members of

OTTAWA, Ont., July 6.—Exemption from the four percent sales tax on fish, made in the House last week, applies not only to the fresh variety but also to canned fish and such products as cod liver oil, officials of the Department of National Revenue said today. The bill providing the exemption has received only second reading in the House of Commons and some changes may be made before it passes finally. The general object of the exemption is not to tax the product of fishermen. This would apply not only to fresh fish, but to the many by products and secondary phases of processing.

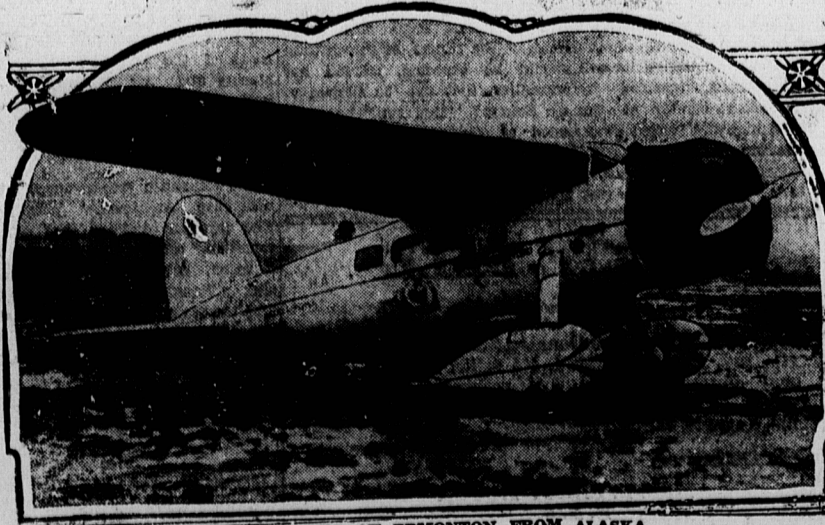
Possibility Of Return To Dollar Wheat

REGINA, Sask., July 6.—Possibility of a return to dollar wheat within the next two months is seen by Sir Neville H. L. Cunliffe, St. James Court, Buckingham Gate, England, a visitor in Regina. "I think you may notice an appreciation in the price of wheat during the next two months on account of adverse conditions here and a world shortage," he said. "Wheat may return to dollar prices, which if maintained means prosperity throughout the West." Sir Neville Cunliffe formerly had extensive holdings of farm lands in Saskatchewan and has been a more or less familiar figure in Regina for nearly 30 years.

London Still The World's Largest City

LONDON, July 6.—London still is the world's largest city by a margin of more than a million inhabitants over New York. Metropolitan London containing the "outer ring" which corresponds to that known as greater New York, has a population of 8,202,808, preliminary summaries of the census taken April 26 indicate. The population of greater New York in the last United States census was 6,981,917 or 1,220,901 less than its British rival.

Two Drowned At Halifax

HALIFAX, N.S., July 5.—A double drowning occurred this afternoon in a small lake off the Prospect Road near Halifax. Mahlon Slaunwhite, 22, and Sepheus Harrie, 31, lost their lives when the punt from which they were fishing capsized. Two others in the party Herman Nowe and his brother George reached safety. Hearing cries for assistance, two men from shore rushed to the rescue but could only pick up one of the quartette, George Nowe. Herman Nowe swam to the beach. Dragging operations for the bodies of Slaunwhite and Harrie were fruitless up to this evening. The former leaves a widow and two children and the latter a widow and six children.

FOX MEN DISCUSS PROBLEMS

A largely attended meeting of fox breeders chiefly from Kings and Queens counties met in the Board of Trade Rooms last evening to discuss proposed amendments to the constitution of the Canadian National Fox Breeders' Association, the annual meeting of which will be held on Wednesday at Summerside. The chief items discussed were the advisability of a reduction in registration fees, and the question of allowing registered and unregistered ranches to be kept on the same farm. Preferential Trade Treaty

CANBERRA, Australia, July 6.—A preferential trade treaty between Canada and Australia was drawn up over the week end and is expected to be presented simultaneously in Ottawa and Canberra on Wednesday. It is understood that Canada grants substantial preferences to Australia on dried, canned and fresh fruits, wines and other primary products, and that Canadian lumber, canned fish and motor chassis will be allowed preferential entry into Australia.
