PARIS, May 17.—The French Communists are becoming prosperous. The party recently has bought a building in Paris at a cost of 400,000 francs (about \$32,000) and present exchange rates which will be used as their headquarters, according to an announcement made yesterday by M. Frossard, the Communist leader.

The money was raised by a loan subscribed by members of the party, he told a meeting of Communists. At the same time, M. Frossard appointed the French delegates to the next congress of the Moscow international.

OPERATION ON BRAIN CURES A. N. Y. CONVICT

OSSINING, N. J., May 19.—Roman Leondowski the Sing Sing prisoner from whose brain Dr. William L. Chapman of Brooklyn, removed a bullet several days ago, was taken today to the Danemora Hospital for the criminal insane to be recommitted to prison as cured of his insanity. Leondowski was an inmate of the Danemora Hospital prior to his operation.

He answered a series of questions rationally and prepared a written statement expressing gratitude to Dr. Chapman for restoring his sanity and curing the violent pains in the head from which he previously suffered. Dr. Chapman, who is partially paralysed, performed the operation while seated in a wheel chair.

ATTACKED BY SWARM OF BEES

BOSTON, May 18.—Five thousand spectators at a ball game on the Metropolitan reservation at Hyde Park, yesterday afternoon were thrown into a panic when a great swarm of bees descended upon them and only the prompt summoning of Michael W. Barrett, 24 Emmett street, known as the "bee king", saved hundreds from being severely stung by the swirling, buzzing angry hosts.

Professor Barrett had the swarm under control in half an hour, though covered with bees from head to foot he was not once stung. He announced that the swarm was composed of tame bees and was not of the wild variety. The excited throngs were quickly calmed, but not until there had been several narrow escapes from auto collisions between spectators whose automobiles were completely enveloped by clouds of the insects.

In all only half a dozen persons were stung by the bees and police reports did not show that any of these required hospital treatment. The bees appeared directly over the baseball diamond with scarcely an instant's warning to the engrossed throngs below.

The game was immediately broken up, players and spectators alike madly waving their arms about their heads and wrapping their coats around their faces. Women and children shrieked wildly, but as far as could be learned all of the half dozen victims were men.

Patrolman John Browne of the Hyde Park station on duty at the reservation, bethought himself of the nearby residence of Mr. Barrett, who came on the run to the scene of greatest activity, which by this time had shifted from the ball diamond into Brainard street. With police clearing the way for him he plunged into a cloud of the insects and began a low droning murmur. This is what he terms "tactile" language.

It is almost soundless, he explains, and he depends upon hypnotic motions of the hands to convey to the bees his real meaning. In this case, he said, he hoped to locate the queen bee, but was unable to do so. Within a few minutes however, he had succeeded in inducing some of the bees to enter his hives and thereafter it was a simple process to gather in the entire swarm. He declared last night there were fully 500,000 bees.

He had not found the queen, although he had spent hours in an effort to do so. Mr. Barrett said the bees seemed to be quite happy with him and he is principally concerned in finding their owner. Up until a late hour no report had come of any tame bee-keeper in the vicinity having lost a swarm.

So perfect was his control of the insects that not a single one was to be found anywhere in the vicinity after the episode. Mr. Barrett explained last night that the probable cause of the

migration of the swarm was that a queen bee had decided upon a new home, and as is the custom in the bee kingdom, had set forth on her quest with her following of thousands of attendant drones and workers. When a beekeeper can succeed in picking out the queen bee and isolating her in a hive the remainder of the swarm is quite docile about following suit.
