Asks Refereundum On Sweepstakes

(By The Canadian Press)

REGINA, April 28—Question of legalizing sweepstakes should be referred to the electorate in a referendum at the next Saskatchewan election, Frank J.C. Cunningham, Regina barrister, suggested in an address here.

Such a course would definitely settle for the present any controversy which may be developing, he said. Discussing the matter academically, Mr. Cunningham put forth arguments for and against sweepstakes and reviewed the history of lotteries.

In a straw vote on the lotteries question recently conducted by The Leader-Post, Regina, the result showed a majority of about 90 to 1 in favor of sweepstakes.

The speaker said lotteries originated in Italy in the middle ages. Queen Elizabeth started the first English lottery in 1569 to raise funds to build harbors. Much of the war against American colonies had been financed by lotteries. Five bridges across the Thames had been so financed; and the original sums for founding the British Museum had been obtained in this way.

Cunningham argued properly conducted lotteries were about the fairest kind of gambling in existence. On the other hand, if gambling was regarded as a vicious habit why not stamp it all out, including betting on horse racing, the Saskatchewan crowd-killing campaign and so on.

Pact To Benefit Northern Ireland

BELFAST, April 28—(CP Press)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill today told the House of Commons that the northern Ireland stood to benefit by the conclusion of the Anglo-Irish accord.
