THE CHECK ON CANCER.

PARIS, May 12.—Prof. Letulle read today an important paper before the Academy of Medicine on the new treatment of cancer discovered by Dr. Julius Gnezdva of Agram, who has pursued his researches in London, Berlin and Paris. Dr. Gnezdva reports a particular case of cancer which he operated upon two years ago in Paris, and which, after an immediate relapse, submitted to his treatment, with the result that the progress of the cancer was arrested. The patient, a lady, now 81 years of age continues in good general health without any evidence of cancerous growth remaining.

Dr. Gnezdva explains his treatment. He does not profess it to be a miraculous cure of various forms of cancer, but what it accomplished is the arrest of cancerous growth, with a certain amount of improvement in the general health of the patient owing to the necrosis of cancerous parts. The paper was read before the academy by a layman, but the substance of the communication is that the treatment prevents the formation of new cancerous growths, and shrivels up to a certain extent those that exist. The preparation used by Dr. Gnezdva consists of an albumen containing a percentage of arsenic and phosphorus of about six milligrammes per gramme, forming a compound which he has named "arphoa line."

The preparation, which is not caustic, is a brownish powder without taste, insoluble in water and in acids, and soluble when warmed in alkalis. It can be applied locally in the form of dry powder or by swallowed in capsules.

Dr. Gnezdva has been experimenting with the treatment for the last nine years, and his method has been observed by the directors of hospitals in Paris and elsewhere, and the give very encouraging reports.

When applied locally the remedy has the effect of causing a partial drying up or necrosis of the tissues and it has been observed that the application causes, in the neighborhood of healthy parts, the formation of new connective tissue, which, little by little, tends to take the place of the cancerous formation.

RICH RESIDENCE ROBBED.

NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., May 15.—Two well dressed men and a young woman, who paid a visit to New Rochelle in an automobile, robbed the residence of Henry Aiken, head, a New York shirt manufacturer, today of about \$2,000 worth of silverware and silk dresses.

Policeman Kierman tried the door and windows of the Aikenhead residence, which is one of the finest in the city, this morning. When he returned later he saw two men and a woman hurriedly leave the house by the front door carrying suit cases. They got into an automobile and drove away. Kierman pursued the car and saw that it carried a Connecticut license number plate. Entrance to the house had been made by cutting a piece of glass out of one of the parlor windows.

SEVERE ENGAGEMENT.

MADRID, May 15.—A severe battle between the Moors and the Spanish troops was fought yesterday near the heights of Hadaja, in the hinterland of Melilla, according to official advices received here from that port today.

The fighting lasted throughout the day and resulted in a defeat of the Moors, who are said to have lost very heavily. A later despatch from the Spanish military headquarters at Melilla says the Spanish troops lost five killed and twenty wounded during the fighting. Among the wounded are two colonels.

A SEA ROMANCE.

PATTERSON, N. J., May 15.—The romance between a native on India and a young woman well known in Paterson society was revealed today with the steaming for Europe of the Kronprinzessin Cecilie, of the North German Lloyd line, and aboard of which they were passengers.

Eluding her father, Charles H. Petry, a wealthy merchant, who was opposed to their marriage, Miss Frances Petry, eighteen and pretty, left her home in East Sixteenth street today and, joined by Dr. Darbari Ram Pal, went to New York city. It is said that their marriage was performed by a clergyman in New York.

Three hours after the steamship left Mr. Petry learned at the offices of the steamship line that the couple had passed passage as "Dr. and Mrs. Darbari Ram Pal, destination India."

Dr. Paul came to this country seven years ago, when a youth. He entered the University of Nashville, from which he was graduated with high honors two years ago. A year ago he was appointed interne at the Paterson General Hospital, and he had intended to leave for his native land in July. Miss Petry, who was interested in hospital work, recently met Dr. Pal and she fell in love with the dashing young East Indian, who speaks English fluently.

Jan Hambourg is one of the first violinists of the day. So charming and at the same time so sweet a cantileno tone is rare indeed. Boris Hambourg is the greatest cello player of modern times and is in the first rank of soloists now before the public. Season tickets for the three concerts of the festival can be obtained at \$2, which price includes the cost of reserve seats.

\$100; FOR A MOOSE.

PERTH, N. B., May 14.—It is now known that the special train which bore Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways, and party over the Transcontinental last week caused the death of a buck deer near Wapke on its return trip. The train roused a buck ahead of the train and then attempted to plunge through a wire fence at the side of the track. The doe escaped but the buck was thrown back. It made a second desperate plunge, however, and it is thought, broke its neck.

General regret is felt over the shipping of the yearling bull moose reared by Emery A. Hallett, of Coronation, to Young Morris, of Trenton Park, (N. J.), last Friday. The animal was a fine specimen and was thoroughly domesticated. It ate hay and oats like a hard working horse and was well halter-broken. Visitors to Perth made it a point to drive to see the animal which would eat fruit from a person's hand.

The moose when a calf but a few weeks old wandered onto the farm of Mr. Hallett, a year ago. A permit to rear it was secured from the surveyor general. Other permits were obtained to sell it and lastly to ship it. The price paid is said to be \$100. Hereafter it will be kept in a state park.

TO HARNESS FALL.

NEWCASTLE, May 14.—John A. Follansbee, who from April, 1905, till April, 1910, was superintendent and engineer of the Newcastle water and light plant, then going to New York and finally to Toronto, where he has been the past eleven months, is home on a mission that may be of great industrial importance to the Miramichi.

He has interested Ontario capitalists in his plan to dam the South-west Miramichi at Grey Rapids, 10, or three miles above Indiantown, and there generate electricity for heat, light and power to be transmitted to the whole Miramichi valley, from Boisetsown to Escumacine.

Charles Quinn, electrical engineer, of New York, will be here about the 15th to investigate and report upon the project to the Ontario backers of the scheme.

Mr. Follansbee, who has been working on the scheme for years, is engaged to visit the Miramichi.
