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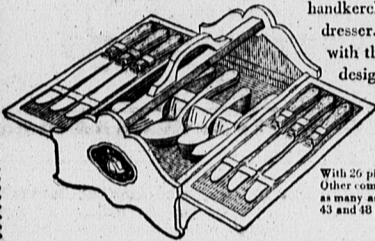

ANTIQUES

GINGHAM

It is quite the thing now to find a plain table covers and single napkins in these "sandy" places. The covers are usually made of plain, one-tone gingham in green, yellow or blue with check napkins.

A STONE CROCK

Have you learned the virtues of the good old stone crock. Bread cake, doughnuts, or any baked goods kept in a stone crock, covered with a big plate, will keep moist and fresh much longer than in the usual tin or paper container. They will not only keep fresher, but they will seem to assume a "ripeness" which comes from a blending of flavor and goodness throughout the mass. Cakes and fried cakes stored in a stone crock, and forgotten, have a delicious flavor when discovered a week later.

To keep vegetables fresh, as head lettuce, celery, beans, sprinkle them with cold water and turn a stone crock over them on the cellar floor. The stone crock will prevent evaporation and keep them cool and prevent their wilting.

DISCOLORED ALUMINUM

Sometimes something which is cooked in an aluminum kettle will discolor it and turn it black. This is an accumulation of iron on the inner surface and is offensive to the eye. We may take comfort, however, in the knowledge that this will not harm the health in any way. If any of that iron is dissolved and absorbed by the next food which is cooked in that kettle, it would benefit rather than injure the health for we need more iron in our foods. There is a great danger in the modern diet that all the valuable mineral salts will be reflected out of it.

BAKING HINTS

When adding soda to batter, it will be distributed more evenly if sifted into the flour rather than being mixed with water and poured in wet. Sift the baking powder with the flour in making biscuits and you will not have yellow streaks in the biscuit. If you sift it twice or three times, so much the better. When you have placed your cake batter in the pan if you cut across it several times with a knife, you will break the air bubbles and have a finer cake, not spoiled by large holes in places.



Get in seeds of all the annuals now.

Transplanting tomato plants twice will make strong, stocky plants.

Don't get any fresh manure in the lot where you are planting eggplants.

Kohl-rabi do best if planted in rows 12 inches apart where it is to grow. Thin to six inches apart.

Get cedar stakes for beans and tomatoes if you can. They will outlast other stakes by years.

Wait till the cool of the afternoon to transplant cabbage and cauliflower plants. They will badly in the morning.

Try some root celery this year. It requires plenty of moisture. The roots are fine for flavoring soups or for slicing in salads.

Every garden should have an herb border. Plant sage for the beauty of its foliage as well as for its flavor. It is an excellent gray-leaved plant for the flower garden.
