Coal Shortage More Serious

NEW YORK, March 14.—(AP)—Complaints of coal shortages became more frequent about the United States today as bituminous operators and union miners sought without success to agree on a new labor contract to permit the resumption of Appalachian production. Mayor Laguardia, who has said the city might be forced to buy or lease a mine to prevent a halt in service of New York's vast rapid transit system unless the long struggle ends soon, made a second appeal for an agreement late today. In a letter, the Mayor said that in many years of intervening in labor disputes he never had seen a case "where the two sides were close tonight on all details and yet seemed so hopelessly deadlocked."
