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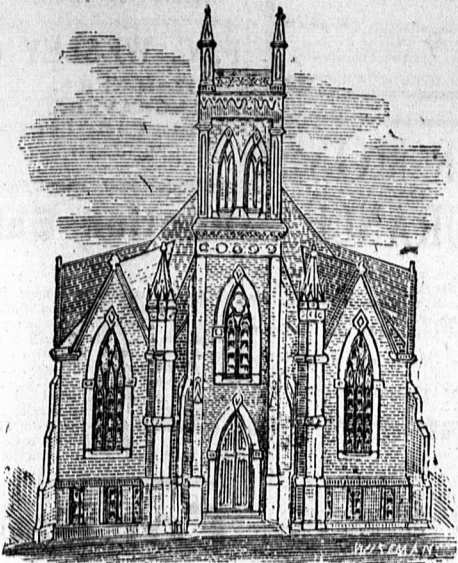

## A PARLIAMENT GRANTED RUSSIA

By Manifesto of Emperor Nicholas, to be Elected by Entire People—Will Serve for Five Years With Limited Powers—Elections At an Early Day.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 18.—(Special).—Emperor Nicholas in a manifesto issued today announced the granting to the people of Russia of a National Consultative Assembly to be formed by the elected representatives of the whole of Russia.

The officers will be selected by the Emperor, who reserves the right to dissolve the Assembly at any time. Its duties will be chiefly to pass upon such laws and other matters pertaining to the government as shall come before Grand Council.

## MINISTERS TO MEET AGAIN ONLY TO SAY A FAREWELL

The Outlook for Peace is Exceedingly Dark—Two Great Points of Dispute are the Questions of the Indemnity and the Cession of Sakhalin—Great Influences are Tending for Peace.

PORTSMOUTH, Aug. 18.—(Special)—All hope of peace is practically ended and the general impression is that when the ministers meet on Tuesday, which will be the next conference, it will be only to say farewell and go through other diplomatic conventions.

During the whole meeting since the negotiations first began Japan has emphatically refused to yield one iota on the claim for indemnity or the cession of Sakhalin and Russia is in the same position. Other conditions have been argued

upon but regarding these two all discussion has only emphasized the original stands taken. But President Roosevelt, King Edward and all the great financiers of the civilized world are exerting their utmost influence and they may be able to do something though the outlook is extremely dark.

## A TERRIBLE SCALDING FATALITY

A terrible scalding fatality occurred on board the S. S. Halifax just as she was leaving the wharf yesterday at one o'clock. When she was pulling out in the stream one of the stay bolts of the boiler running through from end to end, broke and the furnace room was filled with steam and boiling water from the hole about three inches in diameter made by the break. The steamer at once returned to the wharf and it was thought that all had escaped uninjured but further search revealed Jos. Montieth, aged 20, a coal trimmer and brother of Walter Montieth, city, dead in the coal bunker, the exact of which was a hole about two feet square. Inside of this bunker he had been caught and must have been killed almost instantaneously. His head was buried in the coal in an effort to save himself and his body and limbs were scalded in a horrible manner.

John T. Dobie testified that he was engineer on the Halifax and about one o'clock a stay bolt broke on the water space of the boiler. The steam and water was thrown out through the boiler into the engine room and stoke hole. Two engineers and one older were in the engine room working the engines, three men were in the stoke hole—McKey, Backman and Montieth. All got out as quickly as possible except Montieth. He was trimming coal in the starboard chamber, and could not get out. He was not missed until the fires were all out, perhaps half an hour. He was found by Mr. Kiely who went into the bunker to get a shovel and he was there lying dead. This is the first time a stay bolt gave way and I have been on the steamer seventeen years and this bolt was only four years old. You cannot see anything of it so could not avoid the accident by preventing it breaking. The coal was blown about in the bunkers by the force of the steam. It made quite a report. This stay bolt was fixed about a year ago—a new nut being put on. 135 lbs pressure was on the boiler—the capacity is 160 lbs. Boiler was tested this spring to 240 lbs water by steamboat inspector, Alfred Backman—I am fireman on the Halifax. About one o'clock I was in the

stoke hole in the after end. I was in the engine room when the bolt broke. I ran out. When I went to the stoke hole I noticed a slight leak and went in to report it to the second engineer. Just as I was leaving I met him and at the same time the accident happened. I told McVey to get Montieth to get the coal out before I went to the engine room. He must have just got in as a bolt broke. I did not know anything more of it until I heard he was dead. Herbert McVey, fireman on the Halifax said he sent Montieth down to the bunker to put out coal. Witness was down and about to enter the forward stoke hole when the explosion occurred. He ran out on deck when he got to the after stoke hole it was full of steam. He did not know anything about any leak around the stay bolt. Evidence was also given by John W. Kiely, the fireman who found the body, and Dr. F. E. Kelly who examined the remains and pronounced death due to scalding. The verdict arrived at was that the deceased came to his death by scalding by an accident from the blowing out of the stay bolt of the boiler of the steamer Halifax.

## THE CANADA CUP OUT OF CANADA

Last and Deciding Race Won by the Iroquois in a Six Mile Breeze Which was Favorable to the American Yacht.—Canadian Did Will

CHARLOTTE, Aug. 18.—(Special)—The Canada Cup remains in the United States. In the fifth and last race of the series the Iroquois today defeated the Temeraire by two minutes and fifteen seconds. The wind was never more than six

miles per hour, a condition decidedly favorable to the Iroquois, yet the Temeraire made a splendid showing and had it not been for some trouble with her sails on the home stretch the finish would have been closer.

## FOR SETTLING LABOR DISPUTES

Archbishop Bruchesi Proposes a plan which meets with much Favor

MONTREAL, Aug. 18.—(Special)—Archbishop Bruchesi today met with the officers of the Builders' Exchange and labor unions and discussed with them the plan he has proposed for the settlement of all disputes between capital and labor. He advocates a permanent tribunal before whom all disagreements shall come and whose decision shall be final. The plan met with much favor from the representatives of both parties.

## THE BAPTIST INSTITUTE

Holds its Meetings Yesterday—Instructive and Interesting Sessions Held Convention Proper Today.

The Baptist Institute met at 10 a. m. yesterday. In the absence of the President, Dr. J. N. Brown of Hopewell, N. B. was called to the chair. After reading of 46th Psalm by the chairman and prayer by Rev. D. H. Simpson and Rev. E. T. Miller, a paper, written Dr. C. H. Day, Kentville, was read by Rev. L. W. Corbett. This paper, had for topic "Is a belief in immortality essential in the development of a true ethical character." The paper was very scholarly and deeply thoughtful in tone, giving evidence of broad and careful philosophical reading and study. The writer decided the question in the affirmative. An interesting, discussion followed, Dr. Goodspeed being somewhat inclined to answer the question in the negative. The paper was discussed by Dr. Goodspeed, Rev. H. Y. Corey, Rev. E. T. Miller, Rev. Ward Fisher, Rev. A. Chipman and others. Dr. G. O. Gates read a paper on the chapter of Dr. Dod's recent book on "the Bible as compared with other so-called sacred writings." This was also discussed at some length after which a Nominating Committee was appointed to report to the afternoon session and the Institute adjourned.

The afternoon session of the Baptist Institute opened at 2 o'clock with Dr. J. W. Brown in the chair. The first address was given by Rev. G. P. Raymond, subject "The young man problem in the Sunday School" He urged that the school should be graded in such a way as to arrange for regular and public advancement; that attention should be given to the training of teachers; and that the pastor should if possible teach the young men's class. He also favored class organization. Several entered into the discussion of the subject. Then followed the reading of a paper written by Rev. Frank Bishop, subject "The Authority of the Scriptures." In answer to the question "Why do we accept the Scriptures as authority there are two views: One view is that authority is imputed to the Scriptures by the credentials, the authority of external certification. The other view is that the authority of the Bible is binding on the moral conscience because of the moral
