THIS N. B. & P. E. I. Railway Co., have decided to suspend the work of clearing their road between Sackville and Tormentine until the weather improves. The road has been kept clear until within the last week or so but owing to the recent northwesterly storms the line is completely blocked. Since the expense of clearing the road would be about \$500 and the daily returns from freight and passenger traffic are small on account of blockades on other roads, the Company has decided to cease operations for the present.

THE death took place in Montague, Feb. 24th, after a short illness of Ebenezer Campbell, aged 54 years, leaving a sorrowing widow, four sons and five daughters, one son and two daughters in Quincy, Mass., one son at Milliswick, Maine, one at Montague, and one son and three daughters at home. Three sisters in Boston, one in New Hampshire, one in Houlton, Maine, and two at Montague survive him, besides a large number of friends and relatives to mourn the loss of a kind and affectionate father and husband, and a respected member of the Christian Church, Montague.

EASTERN NOTES—Winter conditions of the most pronounced type accompany the snow and frost blockade with which King's is surrounded and enveloped for the last month. Truly, it is now "The Lady of the Snows." Little more has been done than shovelling snow and keeping warm in country parts. Two weeks without getting a mail is something unknown here before this winter. The heaviest kind of ice fills the Gulf and Straits in every direction, and it wants a long siege of south west wind, which the Island is not likely to get this month to clear it out and give the steamers a chance to run.—One of the old landmarks of Cheapside passed away on the 11th inst in the person of Peter Nowlan. Born at Indian River some ninety three years ago he saw many changes during his long life. Of his six sons, five have predeceased him, four of them being drowned out of Gloucester, Mass.—James D. Stewart of West River died very suddenly on the 13th after an illness of a few days. Two sisters, Mrs. James Young and Mrs. Alex Young survive him, and one brother William now in Boston. He had passed the seventy second mile stone.

THERE was a very small attendance at the market yesterday, and country produce was scarce. A basket of eggs was in which sold at 30c per doz. and butter brought 24c. Very little pork was in and the price remains at 6 to 8c.
