BOSTON, July 8—Capt. Fred Bishop and crew of 19 men of the Boston schooner Morning Star rescued by the fishing schooner Mary De Costa, on July 4, arrived in port today. The Morning Star's engine be-

Fishermen Are Picked Up

YARMOUTH, N. S., July 8—(By The Canadian Press) — Straying from the Gloucester schooner Rhodora in fog that blanketed the coast on Saturday, Vincent Muis and Jim Coteau survived Saturday night's gale and landed their dory at Seal Island on Sunday. Word of their arrival was received here today in time to halt organization of a fleet to search the fishing grounds.

They were almost exhausted after their battle with wind and heavy seas but soon were revived by food provided by residents of the island. The Rhodora, which arrived in Yarmouth harbor last night, will return to the fishing grounds as soon as the two men rejoin the crew. She has 10,000 pounds of fish on board.

Cannot Compete With Soviets

TORONTO, July 8—If British builders are willing to pay a higher price for Canadian lumber than that asked by the Soviet Government, Canadian exporters can readily supply them, officials of Toronto lumber firms stated in commenting on the proposal of Lord Rothermere that Great Britain should take 75 per cent of its building lumber from Canada.

The suggestion to divert this branch of trade to Canada from Russia, Finland and Scandinavian countries which enjoy the greater part of it at present was one of the three points made by the British newspaper peer in a suggested programme for reciprocal trade between Great Britain and the Dominion.

"The only thing I see that is an obstacle in our path is the price," said an official of the Bowden Lumber Company, here today. "At present Britain buys lumber from Russia. Soviet labor is so cheap we might not be able to compete. Once this is overcome, however, it would set the wheels of industry revolving in this country."

A representative of the Coast Sawmill Company said if the proposal were carried out, "it would mean millions of feet of lumber export trade more than we are getting now."

"But," he continued, "our lowest possible price would be higher than the Soviet price that Great Britain pays at present. Even Finland and Sweden which have been doing a lumber business with Britain for years past and which are much closer than we are, cannot compete with the Soviet price and consequently have lost trade."

TRAVELS ON FOOT OTTAWA TO DIGBY

DIGBY, N. S. July 8—From Ottawa to St. Bernard, Digby County, in three weeks, travelling the whole distance on foot, is the experience of Luc Comeau, who made the trip as an adventure in sight-seeing. Mr. Comeau was seven days coming to Quebec, proceeding from there to Riviere du Loup, Madawaska, Saint John, Moncton, Amherst, Truro, Windsor and the Annapolis Valley. He covered the distance between Amherst and Truro with 18 hours' continuous walking. He is now visiting his brother, Elisee Comeau, at St. Bernard.

Labor Leader To Be Deported

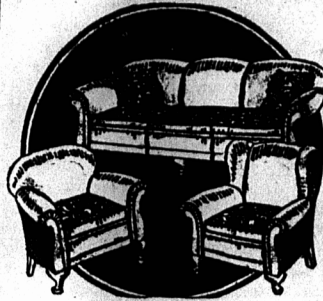
Immigration authorities say McDonald emigrated from England to Canada in 1927, although McDonald himself contends he was born in the Dominion.

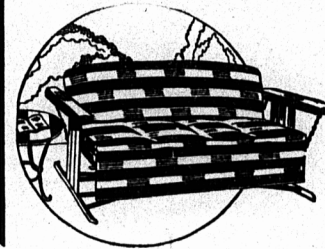

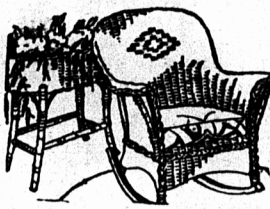

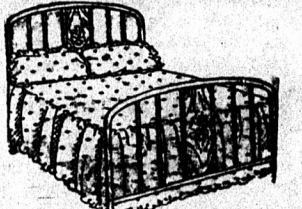

HOLMAN'S Charlottetown

Work to Cease On Electric Plant

TORONTO, July 8—(By The Canadian Press)—Word reached here late last night from Fraserdale on the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario railway, and from Cochrane, Ont., that work upon the electric power project sponsored by

the Ontario Power Service Corporation at Abitibi Canyon would be closed down throwing more than 800 men out of employment.

Premier George S. Henry said late tonight he had been informed of the intended shutdown, after the Ontario cabinet had held a special meeting today to consider plans for taking over by the Province of the power project.

The Abitibi Power and Paper Co., which controls the Ontario Power Service Corporation, was having difficulty in getting money to carry on the project, he said. He presumed the end of ready resources for the project had been reached.

The intended shutdown would have "some effect" upon the Government's consideration of plans to

take over the power scheme, the Premier acknowledged. He declined however to discuss the possible outcome.

The Premier said that so far as he knew no new crisis had been reached in negotiations between the government and the Abitibi officials regarding the future of the Canyon project.
