A gloom was cast over Sea View on Friday Sept. 30th when one of its respected inhabitants, Mrs. Mary E. Stewart succumbed to the grim reaper of death. She was stricken with apoplexy fit about two years ago of which she suffered more or less until the time of her death. She was a kind and obliging neighbor, an honest and consistent member of the Presbyterian church of Long River. She leaves to mourn three sons and four daughters: Joseph on the homestead where she passed away, and George and Lewis of Bon-ton, Mrs. William Graham, Sea View; Mrs. Robert Glover, Somerville Mass; Mrs. Arthur Hartwell, Roxbury and Miss Agnes of Boston. To the bereaved ones friends tender heartfelt sympathy in this their hour of sorrow, but they mourn not as those without hope, for she died fully trusting in the merits of a crucified Redeemer.

The death of Charles Rowe, which took place Tuesday in Charlottetown, will be heard of with regret by all who knew him. Mr. Rowe, who was for 28 years a resident of Moncton, was in the 80th year of his age. He was a native of England, but came to this country 4 years ago, landing at Halifax. He was a railway plate layer, or track layer and came here to work for Blackie and Johnston, who had a contract on what is now a part of the Intercolonial out of Halifax. Mr. Rowe has been in failing health for the last year and a half, death being due to heart failure, of which he had several attacks. He leaves two sons, C. O. of Moncton, and Alfred, chief engineer of the steamer Northumberland which plies between Summerside and Point du Chene, and with whom he had been living for some time. The body was brought to Moncton for interment beside that of his wife, who died some eight years ago.—Moncton Times.

**THE UNIVERSITY DEGREE.**

Mr. William Ramsay Speaks of His Meanings in Some Cases.

I have often seen men whose circumstances or whose character or whose deliberate choice has led them to abstain from taking a degree and who are none the less most successful investigators and who have proved inspiring teachers.

On the other hand, I have perhaps more frequently come in contact with graduates whose only claim to recognition is as parrotlike ability to repeat what has been told them and a knack of gauging the idiosyncrasies of the examiner. The older I get the less I believe in the university degrees as a test of capacity.

The pernicious system of competitive scholarships and fellowships instead of eleemosynary support given to the necessitous and the deserving youth has also contributed to the debasement of the scientific spirit, for it has early implanted in the young mind the idea that to outrun his fellows and to work solely for money reward are the ends to be aimed at instead of the joy of the exercise of a divine gift for the benefit of man.—Sir William Ramsay.

**Salisbury's Fine Contempt.**

The note in Lord Salisbury's character which appeals most to us, though it may not regret, the most is his fine contempt for popularity. Lord Salisbury troubled himself little with what people thought of him. What he was, was much to him; what he was thought to be nothing. This may have been a fault, but it was a splendid and extremely rare virtue in a man. It was the key to his frosty temper. It distinguished him wholly from cynicism. There was no contempt for man, no indifference to things, but a complete contempt for pretended things. This great man was not about to neglect the art of success, while lesser men neglected every other art. Maybe not every man can afford to take Lord Salisbury's view of life; but it is a great thing that one who has been on all men's lips should leave this salutary lesson of care for truth rather than for show. After all, it was what we ought to expect from so deeply religious a man as Lord Salisbury.—Saturday Review.
