THE WOMEN'S PARLIAMENT.

The late Poet Laureate, and greatest of all who held that high literary office foreshadowed a parliament of man and federation of the world. While the world is waiting for the evolution of that great deliberative and legislative assembly and the universal federation, it is worthy of note that a world parliament of the gentler sex is already in being known as the International Council of Women. In this the National Councils are represented while they in turn are made up of representatives of the Local Councils which are planted throughout the civilized world. Many races, languages, kindreds and tongues are embodied in this great organization, which grades the world from east to west and extends from Sweden in the bleak north to New Zealand in the far south.

As in the British or Canadian Parliament reports are presented and measures adopted for the welfare and good government of all parts within their respective jurisdictions, so to the great International Parliament of Women come reports of what the feminine half of the world are doing to promote their own welfare and the uplifting and progress of humanity in general. And by means of correspondence constantly going on, each National and Local Council is now kept informed as they never were before of what their sisters in all other civilized lands are doing. It is highly interesting even for a man to get a glimpse of one of these reports sent out from the National Council of Canada to the numerous Local Councils within its jurisdiction in the Provinces and Territories of the Dominion.

Here we learn that the National Council of Denmark has secured important amendments to the factory act, have prepared a bill to remedy the ill-treatment of children, and are making an effort to secure the municipal franchise for women. And here we are told that the National Council of Great Britain have been considering a score of subjects among which are university education for women, the present position of women suffrage, public house trusts, wage-earning children, the care of the feeble minded, popular amusements for working girls, the relation of amusements to health, and many kindred topics.

And next in order comes the report from the National Council of Holland, which has organized a way of pensioning working women, and has arranged a system of information by cards and personal attendance at the railway and shipping stations for the benefit of women travelling alone. In Amsterdam the work at one of the two railway stations is done by Roman Catholic ladies, and at the other by Protestant ladies, who cooperate in the most friendly way, and see that young women arriving in that city are directed to suitable homes, or respectable hotels or boarding houses. The Council also induced the authorities of Amsterdam to appoint a woman as one of the four well-salaried inspectors of schools.

Next we are told what the National Council of New Zealand is doing. Here they have discussed such subjects as the duty of the state to destitute children, education, culture, prison reform, removal of women's political disabilities, equal wages for equal work, man's rights, women's claims, old age pensions, peace and arbitration, food reform, temperance, domestic service and gambling. And with this Council action follows discussion, petitions are sent to the Legislature, and as all adult women are voters, the woman's view of the case is frequently crystallized into law. It is to be observed

that the reports from the National Councils of Tasmania and Victoria indicate a like activity and progressive spirit. In Victoria a bill is pending before the Legislature to give women the voting franchise in state or provincial affairs. They can already vote in the election of Senators and Members of the Commonwealth Parliament.

And here, too, we have a report from the National Council of Argentina followed by that of France, Canada and so on. Lest we should think the women of Argentina are frivolous and superficial creatures we are told of the number who are now attending the university, some of them taking the course in arts and philosophy, others taking a medical, dental or engineering course, while a little army of 1,459 women are teaching in the schools of Buenos Ayres alone, with only 333 men to assist them.

In France the National Council has now a federation of 40 societies and a membership of 28,000 women. Space will not now permit even an outline of their interesting work and progress, but from what has been stated above it will be seen that the Women's Councils are doing a great work in every quarter of the civilized world, which is growing from year to year in extent and usefulness and bids fair in the years to come to be a most powerful factor in uplifting the human race, in promoting universal peace, and in bettering the moral and social condition of the world.
