RANKING WIDOW STILL PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 21.—One of the still unsolved social precedence controversies of this capital—which has been many of them—is where to put ex-president widows.

There is no definite State Department ruling on where they shall sit at the official dinner tables. The result is that they, mostly, don't.

They shine instead at women's luncheons and at teas and as honor guests at mixed dinners where none who might "rank" them are invited.

For the ever-in-demand Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, who has long lived here, the term "co-hostess" seems to have been especially coined. If a "cabinet wife" should wish to honor Mrs. Wilson, instead of being seated on her right in the usual manner she makes her co-hostess for protocol's sake and puts her at the opposite end of the table. The ranking honor guests are then seated at the right and left of the hostess, and the next two at the right and left of Mrs. Wilson.

Mrs. William Howard Taft has also fallen into the co-hostess category, but the arrangement is not looked upon as an ideal and adequate solution of the ex-president's widow-social-precedence problem.
