MRS. COL. INGS WRITES AN ISLAND MOTHER

The following letter has been received by Mrs. Leon J. Arsenault of Abram's Village. The letter refers to her son Aubin who is in the hospital, having been wounded about a month ago.

Highdown, Millford, Surrey, England, May 17th, 1917.

Dear Mrs. Arsenault, When your son was sent on draft from the 105th battalion to France, my husband Col. Ings told them if they were ill or wounded and sent back to England, to let him know and send their address. Your son remembered and wrote him. My husband and the battalion are still at Witley Camp, expecting that every week will be the last. It is now very hard to get any leave and my husband has not been able to get to London, but I had to go this week for two days, and my husband said I must be sure and see your son. As of course you know, he is in St. Thomas Hospital, an immense hospital just across Westminster Bridge on the other side of the Thames from the beautiful houses of Parliament. It is a wonderful place, and I found your boy in a large and beautiful ward, the Albert Ward. He looks very well indeed, and is very cheerful and comfortable; he says he does not have any pain, and has scarcely ever had any. The shrapnel bullet wound in his shoulder he showed me, it is nicely healed. He said even when he was hit, he did not suffer; perhaps that was on account of the shock I do not know, but it is grand when our boys do not suffer. He has the very best of care and everything done for him. His leg is in a splint, a sort of iron thing that goes right under him from his shoulders down. I asked him if it was uncomfortable and he said "not a bit" and lifted himself to show me how it was all padded. I never saw anything like it in Canada. He had his prayer beads beside him and told me the priest visited him there. Also, he told me the thought it would be a good while before he could leave the hospital, probably some months; that his leg would be alright, but that there was every probability that when

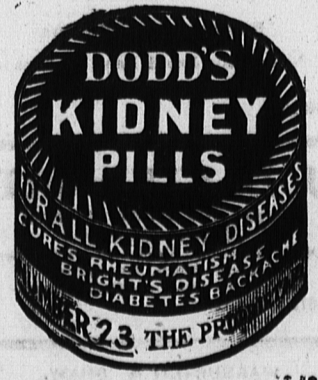

HOW TO REPEL THE CLOTH MOTH

Most people are familiar with the injury done to woollen fabrics and furs by the cloth moth. This insect does not confine itself to the household pest, but it can also be found in clothing and dry goods stores. The adult is a small buff-colored moth about three-fourths of an inch in length and is harmless, all the depreciation being confined to the larvae stage. The larvae are case-borers and are never seen away from their movable cases. In appearance these cases ap-



pear as matted masses of wool having the same general color of the substances from which they are constructed, hence they are somewhat difficult to detect. The adults appear from July to September and deposit their eggs upon some woollen fabric or furs for the succeeding generation. Unfortunately, there is no effective method of preventing the damage done by these insects. Consequently in infested quarters frequent inspections are demanded wherever these insects become troublesome. It is generally assumed that the various repellents, such as tobacco, camphor, mothballs, etc., will free garments of this pest. The above mentioned repellents are useful inasmuch as they will prevent the moth from ovipositing where they are placed, but they do not prevent the developments of eggs or

larvae on infested goods. The most effective method for this pest is to thoroughly sun and brush the cloth desired to be laid away. Then place in a tight box or trunk with a good supply of one of the above mentioned repellents. This will prevent reinfestation. DR.
