LOCAL PRICES.—There was a small market yesterday. The dealers are paying prices as follows for staple produce: Oats 75c bush., potatoes 60 to 65c, turnips 20c bush., hay 15 a ton, straw \$10, pork 22 1/2c best weights up to 130 pounds. There is very little pork coming in at present. Dealers are paying 40c per lb for 1 lb blocks of butter 37c for crockery, 38c for tub and 42 for 1 lb creamery blocks. Eggs bring 46c per dozen.

The results of the Medical Council of Canada examinations which were held during the past week at McGill University, the Royal Victoria and Notre Dame Hospitals have been announced. The examination carries with it registration on the Canada Medical Register, with the diploma L. M. C. C., which is a qualification accepted by all the provinces as sufficient for license and registration to practice without further examination of any kind. Among those receiving licenses are Robert H. MacLachlan, formerly of Charlottetown and W. Keefe of Alberton.

CAPT. CULLEN DEAD.—Mr. James Cullen of Alexandria received a telegram from St. John's Nfld., yesterday stating that his brother Captain Fredk. Cullen had died in the Hospital there after a few days illness. Capt. Cullen was home only about three weeks ago renewing old friendships and his early death is a great shock to his relatives and friends who anxiously await the full particulars. He left here for St. Johns to take charge of the steamer Wellington and was preparing to leave with his ship for Greece on Naval transport service. A telegram received by his brother, Mr. James Cullen, yesterday stated the remains would be leaving St. John's for Charlottetown today.

The last meeting of the Cheese Board for the season was held in the city yesterday. The following was the board message: "Seventeen hundred cheese boarded twenty four and quarter bid no sales sold on curb eight to quarter higher small make." Thirteen hundred and seventy-five cheese were boarded of which eight hundred and seventy five were sold to R. E. Match for twenty four and one quarter cents.

A great deal of dissatisfaction was expressed regarding the shortage of cheese boxes, and it was the wish of the Board that the makers of boxes would speed up the production in some way and thus give the factories a chance to get their quota out of the way. It is very embarrassing both to the buyer and the seller to be up against the proposition of shortage in cheese boxes.

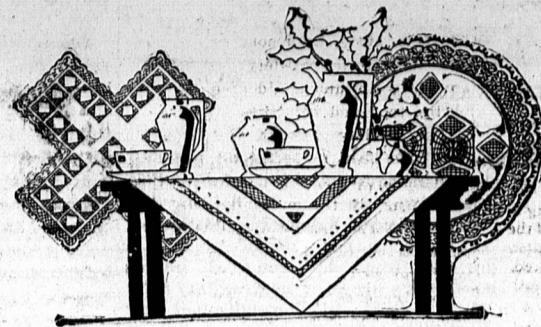
ABOUT LIQUID MANURE. Expert States Facts That Are Not Widely Known. Much may be done by the use of liquid manure to make good the shortage of fertilizers. An English authority has made an analysis bearing on this point. He says: "Let us take the urine of the cow, for example, remembering that its value is increased or diminished in proportion as the foods consumed are rich. An average sample, however, contains 0.8 per cent. of nitrogen, 0.7 per cent. of phosphoric acid, and 0.6 per cent. of potash. In a sample of the fresh manure of the cow, for example, remembering that its portion of the nitrogen present is only 0.34, of phosphoric acid 0.18, and of potash 0.4, so that, weight for weight, the liquid manure of the cow is worth as plant food double as much as the dung which she produces, and to which the straw is added."

IN A lengthened experiment the mixed manure of the cow, liquor and solid, contained 0.40 per cent. of nitrogen, 0.3 per cent. of phosphoric acid, and 0.34 per cent. of potash, yet in any case were liquid or solid to be kept for a lengthened time the loss would be considerable, and consequently the value much diminished. Thus we see that the urine of the cow is very much greater in value, weight for weight, than the mixed solid dung and urine, without straw.

The urine of the horse and sheep is much richer in nitrogen and about equal in potash; in the case of the horse and pig it is much richer in phosphoric acid, but poorer in nitrogen and potash, so that where the liquid is the mixed urine of the different classes of stock it is immensely superior in value to the liquid of the cow, as well as the solid manure of any class of stock, separate or mixed, whether as regards nitrogen or phosphoric acid, which are by far the most valuable constituents of all manurial matter.

The cows kept at a certain farm averaged in production, solid and liquid manure, without litter, 70 pounds daily, or about 1 1/4 tons per head per annum, and these animals were of average size—about 1,000 pounds in weight. But on the basis of other work the average quantity of solid manure produced by the cow is nine tons, and of liquid 3 1/2 tons. Now, a cow producing nine tons of solid manure in round numbers will yield 68 pounds of nitrogen; similarly, if she produces 3 1/2 tons of urine, both of average quality, she will produce 84 pounds of nitrogen value—and this is much the most important—as the liquid of the cow is almost equal to that of the solid manure.
