BANDITS PLAYING HAVOC IN CHINA

OTTAWA IS PREPARING FOR ELECTION

Forms of Election Forms Are in Transit to the 245 Returning Officers Spread Across the Dominion.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 28—Tons of election forms are in transit to the returning officers spread across the Dominion. But this does not carry with it any special significance, a 1930 general election. It does not, however, the whipping of election machinery into working shape—accordance with an amendment to the Dominion Election Act, passed at the last session of Parliament. The old voters' list system has been "scrapped." For some years, it has been the practice to use provincial lists as the basis for Dominion election lists. The next general election, however, will witness a system under which enumerators and rural clerks will be required to make a list to house canvass on the issue of election writs, in the preparation of more up-to-date and authentic lists. This innovation is another feature of the amended act.

READINESS TO PUT MACHINE IN MOTION

The whole scheme is that immediately on receipt of a telegraphic message returning officers will be in readiness to put the election machinery into immediate operation. And this reason it is essential that the officers have all election forms in hand to guard against delay in dealing with contingencies bordering either sea coasts and as far north as the Yukon territory. Permanent returning officers in their constituency have been appointed since the last session. Of number, perhaps a score, it is stated are former officials in that line, whose status under the old Dominion Elections Act, was more or less temporary. From 18,000 to 20,000 rural registrars have been named, while approximately 6,000 enumerators have been selected to complete the machinery. The new legislation provides for holding of elections sixty days after the issue of writs. The purpose of this provision is apparent by reason of an official calculation that it actually takes fifty-eight days for the more modern act to put all election machinery into full force and effect.

The interior of the building was tastefully decorated with banners and varicolored lights. Booths exhibiting various mechanical and electrical paraphernalia lined the sides brilliantly illuminated.

Chinese Bandits Kill Thousands

(Canadian Press) SHANGHAI, April 28—Chinese press dispatches received today stated that 1,000 men, women and children, Chinese country folk were massacred and 1,000 more captured Saturday by bandits who looted and burned the town of Kiangsu on the northern border of Kiangsi and Angweip Provinces. The bandits said the Advice displayed ferocity that was unparalleled in the annals of banditry in China which is now taking place on a gigantic scale. One hundred of the bandits mounted on horses, set up thirty machine guns and raked the streets, moving down the helpless villagers. Captives were forced by departing brigands to carry the loot. The outrage occurred about 100 miles north of Nanking, Nationalist Government Capital of China.

TELEPHONE LINKS NATIONS

Talks To Britain And United States From Speeding Train.

MONTREAL, April 28—Canada took a commanding lead in the telephone race when long-distance communication between a moving train and cities on the North American continent and Great Britain was successfully accomplished. The train was the Canadian National Railway "International Limited" which also inaugurated a new schedule by making the journey from Toronto to Montreal, 234 miles away, in 260 minutes. This schedule is the fastest in the world for a train of the same size and weight, and calls for a speed of close to seventy miles an hour at times. The new telephone system was demonstrated to a group of Canadian and American newspaper men and officials of the railway, and some sixty calls were placed from the speeding trains.

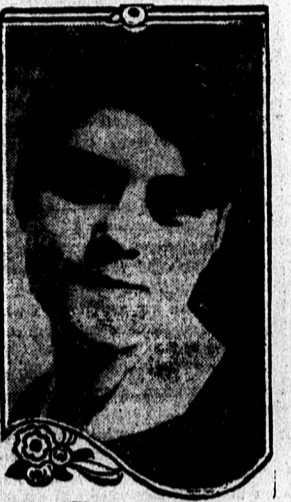
Indian Nationalists Inaugurate New Phase Of Civil Disobedience

Will Accept British Treaty

LONDON, Eng., April 28—The Egyptian Government, realizing the disastrous consequences of a refusal to accept the British treaty terms, has instructed Premier Nahas Pasha to sign the document which establishes Egypt as a really independent state. A special messenger from Cairo reached London today by aeroplanes carrying the consent of the Egyptian Cabinet and King Fuad, which will enable the Egyptian delegation here to sign the treaty in the course of the week.

Less Work For C.N.R. Mechanics

Change To Five Day Week, Operative May 1. Will Affect 70 Employees In This City.

Owing to a falling off in revenue general throughout the railway system of the continent, it has been decided to inaugurate a five day working week in the various mechanical departments and car shops of the Canadian National Railway throughout the Dominion. This step, which becomes effective on May 1, is a result of an agreement entered into between the management and the men to reduce the hours of service rather than to reduce the staff, and is applicable to the local mechanical department of the Island Division. About seventy local men will be affected by the change.

Members Medical Profession Will Meet In Toronto

(Special to the Guardian) TORONTO, Ont., April 28—Members of the medical profession and nurses numbering about 1,000 will gather in Toronto on May 19, 20 and 21 for the 19th annual meeting of the Canadian Public Health Association and the 16th annual meeting of the Ontario Health Officers Association. Delegates are expected from Halifax to Vancouver and the important centres between, and they will discuss sanitation, child hygiene, nutrition and pregnancy, maternal mortality, school hygiene, health legislation and preventorium care. The meetings will take place in Hart House and the medical building of the University of Toronto. Dr. A. J. Douglas, Medical Health Officer, of Winnipeg, is President of the Canadian Public Health Association, and Dr. W. L. Hutton, Medical Health Officer of Brantford, is President of the Ontario Health Officers Association.

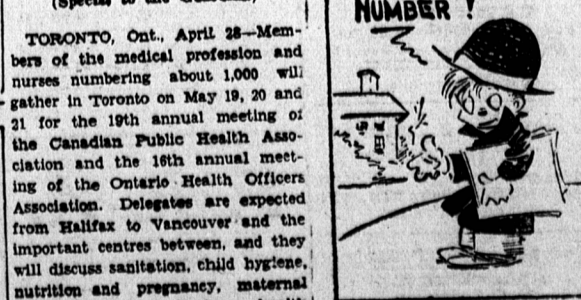
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The Weather, etc
