He was a native of Rustico, where in early life he taught school, going afterwards to the Matapedia Valley, where, and in other parts of Quebec, he also taught school and was a fisherman. He came to Summerside over forty years ago, where at first he fished and burnt lime, which was then quite an island industry. In latter life, being a man noted for his integrity and good scholarship, he held eight positions of trust and usefulness. He was a great reader of the newspapers and literature of both languages and was one of the best informed citizens on general topics. There are left to mourn three sons and four daughters, only one of whom, Mrs. Charles Arsenault, of Summerside, now resides in this province. The funeral, which was largely attended, took place on Tuesday morning at St. Paul's Church and Cemetery, Rev. Urban Gillis officiating. S.
