PROPOSED SECULARIZATION OF MARRIAGE

Rev. T. F. Fullerton in a letter to a local evening paper joins issue with The Guardian on the question of the proposed secularization of marriage, and wants to know where we stand in this grave issue.

To some extent Rev. Mr. Fullerton appears to share our views as against secularization, for when he speaks of it he adds the words, "much as every Protestant would dislike it."

Here, then, we have the Protestant higher church courts trying to lead their people to further a movement to which the people have a strong dislike—a very remarkable and anomalous state of affairs.

cently dissolved the ministerial party made up more than three fourths of the membership. To overcome so great odds appears an almost hopeless task for the Opposition, and an election seldom becomes exciting under such circumstances.

It is a remarkable tribute to the Murray Government that after fifteen years of power under one leader, and twenty-nine years for the party, it should stand so strong.

For another reason increased representation at the left of the Speaker is desirable. It is due to the right working of democratic institutions that all shades of opinion should be represented somewhat in proportion to their numbers.

One reason for this state of things has been the unequal distribution of seats in proportion to population which still exists and operates powerfully in favor of the Murray Government in the present contest.

The provincial election in Nova Scotia will be watched with interest in other provinces for any indication it may give as to the Dominion election which is now approaching, but it will be doubtful how far the probable Conservative gains in the provincial contest will form a basis for a sound judgment in that regard.

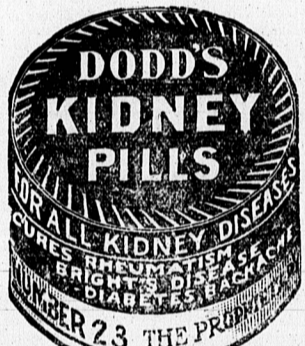

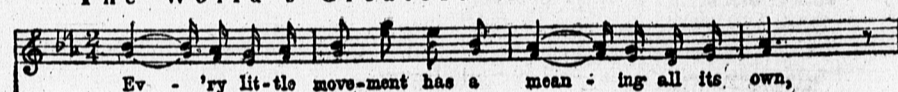
