These three provinces are kept on the Truro Bearcats, our champions. But we must know what the rest of the Dominion is doing. Each district has just about declared its finalist.

Again here the Quebec finals produced a wicked series. The M. A. A. A. six senior champs, are having the work out to turn aside the intermediate threat. The St. Francois Xavier six fought their higher ranked opponents to a scoreless draw in the opener and again did the trick at 1-1 last night, necessitating a third game, the winner to meet the Bearcats.

Meanwhile the Ottawa Shamrocks, flushed with their second successful championship of Ottawa and district, having first captured the City League in the capital, and then vanquished the Brockville intermediates, champions of their class, are awaiting the Ontario champs, Iroquois Falls, N.
