**A NEAR ACCIDENT.**—The S. S. Halifax which arrived in Charlottetown yesterday evening from Boston had a bit of exciting experience just after leaving Halifax. Tuesday morning in a dense fog she collided with the U. S. Revenue Cutter, Seneca, striking her first on the stern and swinging around crashed into the life boats on the starboard davits. The crews of both steamers were immediately ordered to stations to await developments. There was no excitement among the passengers, owing to the skillful management of both captains. The Seneca had just dropped anchor and had not time to blow her signals before the Halifax came upon her. A hurried examination showed that no serious damage had been done with the exception of the breaking of one or two of the Seneca's life boats, scrap tin and miscellaneous goods were what, but the damage sustained was slight and after the passengers had been assured there was no danger, she proceeded on her way to Charlottetown.
