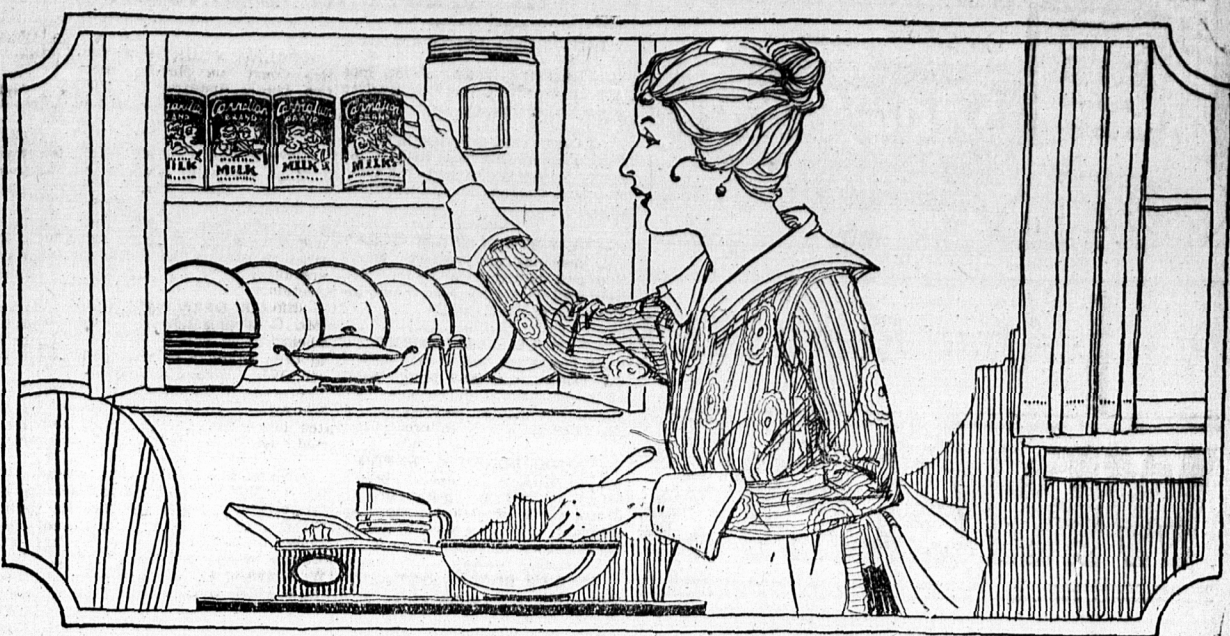

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RICE PUDDING

2 1/2 cups water, 1 1/2 cups Carnation Milk, 1/3 cup rice, 1/2 teaspoonful salt, 2 table-spoonfuls sugar. Wash rice, mix ingredients, and pour into buttered baking dish.
