RECEIVED GERMAN LETTER.—Miss Jenny Robertson, Alexandra, recently received a letter from Koenigsburg, Germany. Miss Robertson has never been abroad and is acquainted with no one in Germany. The letter was passed by the censor and evidently contains nothing of a harmful nature. Miss Robertson is unacquainted with the language herself and so far, has succeeded in finding no one able to decipher the strange missive. Naturally the interest of all is aroused and the letter forms the chief topic of conversation in the locality.

The London, England Daily Mail of a recent date contains the following: the gold watch subscribed for by the members of the Munition Marine Service Association in recognition of the fact that he had been awarded the V. C. for meritorious war services was yesterday presented to Lieutenant Ronald Neil Stuart, R. N. R., D. S. O. V. C., by the Lord Mayor of Liverpool. (Colonel Ritchie), at the town hall.

"Lieutenant Stuart is the first and only Liverpool ship's officer to win the decoration, and he is one of the 'mystery V. C.'s.' His exploit the Admiralty have not yet given permission to divulge, but he was elected to receive his distinction by the vote of several brother officers. He is the son of the late Captain Neil Stuart, of Prince Edward Island, Canada, and Mrs. Stuart, of 31 Kelvin-grove, Liverpool. His ancestors, all Liverpool men, have been captains of the merchant service.

"In expressing his thanks to the members of M. M. S. A. yesterday Lieutenant Stuart said that the particular branch of work in which he had been engaged at the time he won his V. C. was run with very few exceptions, by men of the mercantile marine."

MacRae and Annie MacTowan Boswall band and wife. The words were spoken and the nuptial knot tied by the Rev. D. Maclean. About thirty sat down to a tea provided by Mrs. Boswall which could not but satisfy the most fastidious. The bride was escorted to the parlor by her father and the piano was presided over by the sister of the bride, Miss Erna H. Boswall. A few evenings previous to this clearing event a number of the friends of the bride gave her a "kit chen shower", and indeed it was a heavy shower everything required in the kitchen was provided even Maggie's rolling pin. On the end a cartoon of Mr. Jiggs himself, which reflected much credit upon the artist. Many portical effusions accompanied the various utensils, some of more than ordinary merit and causing quite a lot of merriment. The presents brought on the evening of the marriage were both numerous and valuable, varying from the silver spoon to the fifty and one hundred dollar cheques. The happy couple must certainly have been made happier by such a display of valuable presents. The bridegroom, who is not only one of the most prosperous farmers of Central Ontario, but of the province, has made no mistake we believe in the selection of his fair partner. His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, Governor General of Canada, and party arrived in Charlottetown last night at 7 o'clock. Although it was known in advance that there was to be no special demonstration on arrival a large number of citizens gathered at the depot to get a first glimpse of His Excellency. When the party alighted from the train and as soon as His Excellency was recognized the immense throng that had gathered voiced their welcome in prolonged cheers.

The Vice Regal party was driven at once to Government House.

His Excellency and party were met at Borden by the Honorable Premier Arsenault, Major Bartlett, A. D. C., to His Honor the Lieut. Governor, Judge A. A. McDonald, Private Secretary, His Worship Mayor Wright and the Hon Justice Hazard who went to Borden by special train, Supt. Grady having placed his private car at their disposal. Accompanying the party to and from Borden were representatives of the Examiner, Patriot and Guardian.

During the trip to Borden the party had the opportunity of seeing the progress made in the standardization of the Railway, Supt. Grady giving much valuable information. Of the sixty miles between Summerside, Borden and Charlottetown, twenty-two miles have already been completed including the line from Emerald to Borden; this whole section of sixty miles has been ballasted and laid with standard ties all ready for the third rail.

Rails have been distributed along the whole section with the exception of five miles between Hunter River and Elliott's and five miles between Emerald and Kelvin, ten miles in all. The rails for these ten miles, with ten miles extra, are on board the steamer J. A. Mackie which as previously reported lies stranded near New London, Conn.

According to a telegram received yesterday by Supt. Grady the steamer MacKee is a total loss but it is hoped the cargo of rails will be salvaged though too late to get here this winter.

The work of standardization is practically over for the winter as weather conditions now are such as to make it impracticable to continue. The one hundred Germans who have been employed are being sent back to Borden today, orders having been received that they must be in Amherst by the 11th.

The party while en route to Borden were most hospitably entertained by Supt. Grady who provided them with an excellent dinner admirably served and thoroughly enjoyed.

BORDEN TO CHARLOTTETOWN

The Vice Regal party arrived at Borden at 4.30 and after introductions at the pier immediately entrained for Charlottetown. The party consists of His Excellency the Governor General, Col. the Hon. H. G. Henderson, Governor General's secretary, Hon. Richard Nevill, Comptroller; Major Irwin, of the Princess Patricia Light Infantry, A. D. C. and Captain the Earle of Min-to, Scots Guards, A. D. C. The run home was an exceedingly pleasant one, the members of the vice regal party being most congenial, interested in what was told them of the Island province and gleaming such information as they could regarding its business, its resources, winter communication &c. &c.

They left Ottawa on Monday, visited Fredericton on Tuesday; St. John, Wednesday; Moncton, yesterday morning. They were all greatly pleased with the reception they met with and while they expressed regret that the visit happened in the winter it was explained that His Excellency was anxious to see the people rather than the country and he hoped to pay another visit to the maritime provinces during the summer.

The party leaves Charlottetown tomorrow morning for Summerside, leaving in the afternoon via Borden for Halifax. From Halifax their itinerary will include Antigonish, New Glasgow, and Sydney. On the return to Ottawa they will visit Newpasstie, Chatham and Rimouski, arriving in Ottawa on the 16th.

This morning's programme outlined in the Guardian yesterday will be carried out.

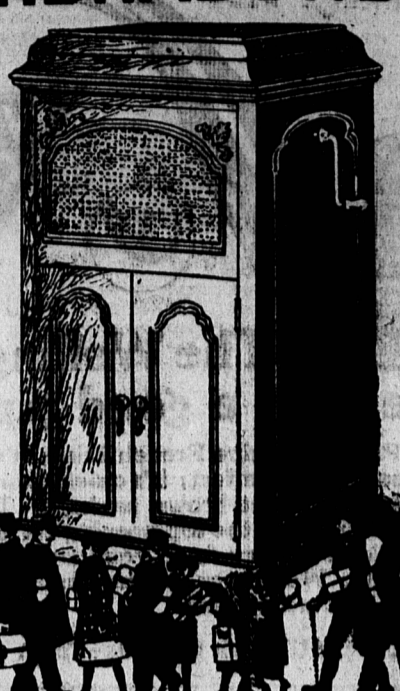

PROBABLE PERSONNEL OF CONFERENCE

LONDON, Dec. 6.—It is understood the peace conference is to be composed for the main conference of not more than five delegates from each of the principal Allied powers, the British delegates mentioned are Ex-Premier Asquith and Lord Milner and a representative from the Dominions. It is impossible to find seats for all the Dominion representatives. The rival claims will probably be settled by agreement among the Dominions Premiers. Besides the main conference there will be innumerable special panels to investigate matters of special interest, special reports and different aspects of the subjects for
