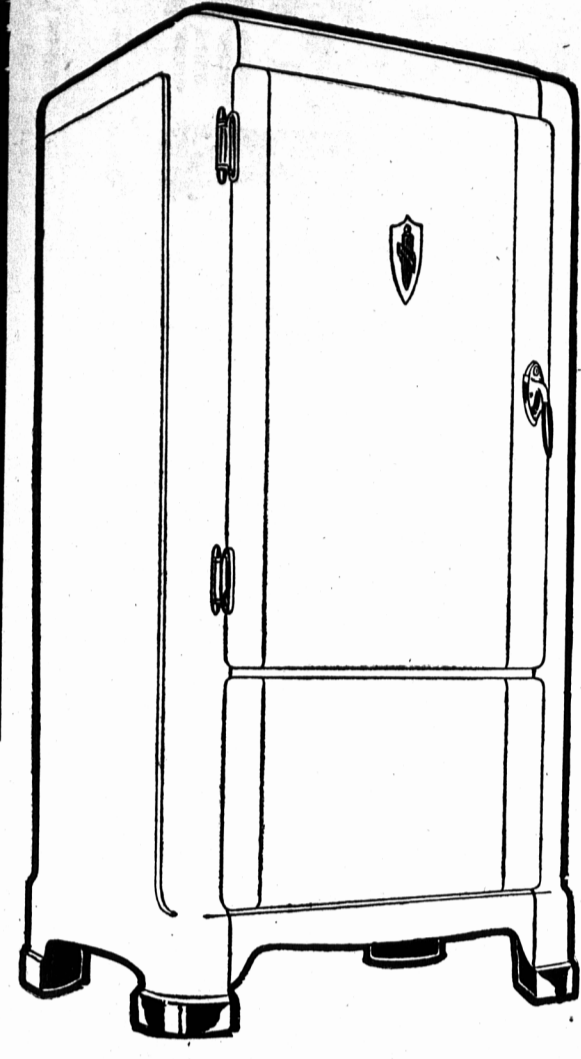


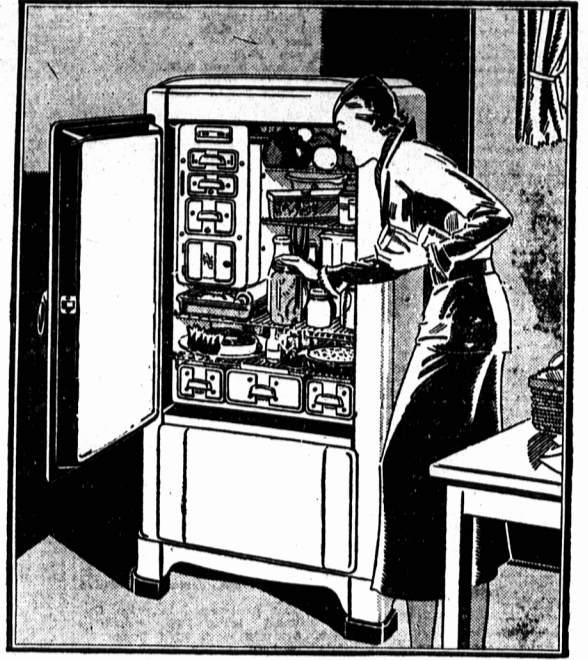

## HALIFAX BOY MAKES GREAT SHOWING

Dan Wallace, Oxford Student, Beaten By Half a Length In Diamond Sculls Preliminary Heat.

(C. P. and A. F. Cables) (By Guardian's Special Wire) HENLEY-ON-THAMES, Eng., July 4.—With a series of 36 races the historic Henley Regatta, Great Britain's annual rowing classic, got off to a grand start today with the rowing of preliminary heats in the Diamond Sculls and crew events. The first day brought the elimination of the one Canadian contender, Dan Wallace, of Halifax, a student at Oxford, who was beaten by a bare half-length by R. E. Whinstone of Molesey-on-Buck. Wallace rowed a great race and forced Whinstone to make the best time of the day, eight minutes and 15 seconds. The all-time record for the course is 8:10 and Whinstone's next fastest race today. The present holder of the coveted Diamond Sculls, Herbert Buntz of Germany, had an easy time remaining in the running by defeating Guglielmo Douglas of Uruguay. He covered the course of a mile and 550 yards in 8:39 and won by three lengths.

The Quinton Club of London triumphed over their co-favorites in the Thames Challenge Cup, the Kent. Conn. Schoolboy Eight, Quinton gained a two-thirds length victory in 7:11 and now stands as the favorite to carry off the cup. Two other United States entries are still in the hunt for the trophy, the Yale lightweight and Tabor Academy, which defeated the first Trinity Eight of Cambridge and Maidenhead College crew respectively today. The Yale four scored an easy win over Molesey-on-Bucks in the Wyford Cup trials, leading at the finish by five lengths in 8:19. Another sculls event saw Wintrop Rutherford acting coach at Princeton University, win from A. V. C. Douglas of the Scots Guards in 8:46. Douglas had been regarded as a strong contender but the American won by three lengths. Still another Princeton sculler remained in the running when Henry Digbee beat H. L. Warren of England by four lengths in the slow time of 8:56. The other sculls event of the day found E. Wingate of the Vesta Rowing Club, England, paired with E. C. Branco of Brazil. The Britisher won by three lengths in 8:56.

## IN MEMORIAM

DEATH OF BROTHER GEORGE, F. S. C. SUPERIOR OF MONT LA SALLE

On May 20th Christian Brothers lost one of their best known educators on the Pacific Coast in the person of Brother George, F. S. C. Called to the life of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, Robert Deagle, then in his 20th year, left his home in Souris West on Prince Edward Island, Canada to come to California to begin his life's work as a religious teacher. He entered the Christian Brother's Novitiate at Martinez in August of 1884 with seventeen other young men who came with him from Prince Edward Island. After his postulant-ship was completed he was assigned to the Order and took the name of Brother Ximenez George.

At the completion of his Novitiate and scholastic training he began teaching at the Sacred Heart College on Eddy Street in San Francisco. He was also engaged in the same capacity later on in the Christian Brother's College in Sacramento, California. The Superiors recognizing his ability placed him in charge of Blanchett Institute, Portland, Oregon where he was very successful. After some years in Portland he took charge of St. James' College in Vancouver, Washington, and later the direction of St. Patrick's School in Walla Walla, Washington. From 1915 to 1918 he was the President of the Christian Brothers Business College in Portland. During the occasion of the Golden Jubilee of Sacred Heart College in San Francisco, in 1926, Brother George was the directing hand that brought College inter-collegiate prominence in numbers and scholastic standing. From 1927 to 1930 he was director of the resident students of St. Mary's College. They found in Brother George a kind and wise counsellor and professional man look back today upon him as their real friend and prudent adviser.

During the many years of active service in both California, Oregon and Washington, thousands of boys and young men came under his influence and example. Many of the leading priests, judges, lawyers, doctors and other professional and business men owe their early training to this excellent teacher. From 1930 to 1932 Brother George was in charge of St. Mary's High School, Berkeley, but as his health was failing, less strenuous work was given him as director of resident students of St. Mary's College. In May of this year, he and two of his confreres celebrated his Golden Jubilee with elaborate ceremonies at St. Mary's College. Monsignor, religious and secular clergy, a large number of Brothers, relatives and friends were in attendance. The Jubilee sermon was preached by the Reverend Father W. P. Sullivan, pastor of Holy Redeemer, and one of Brother George's former pupils.

At the time of his death at Napa he was acting as Superior of the retired or Ancient Brothers residing at Mont La Salle, Requiem High Mass was sung by the Reverend Father Gaudet, Pastor of St. John's Church, Napa. He also read the burial service at the grave. Present in the sanctuary were the Rev. Fathers Brennan, Pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Berkeley; Father Lamb, O. P., Superior of the Monastery at

Benicia; Father Kennedy, Pastor of St. Paul's Church, San Francisco; Father Curtis, Pastor of Yontville; Father Barrigan, O. P., Chaplain of Mont La Salle Novitiate; Father Robert Senon, Chaplain of the Juniorate at Mont La Salle and the Rev. Father Oehm, C. S. S. A. number of Christian Brothers from their different schools and many former pupils, relatives and friends were present. Noticeable among the floral offerings was a six foot floral cross given by the employees of Mont La Salle Vineyards. The funeral arrangements were in charge of the Webber Undertaking Company of Napa.

Brother George was in his 70th year and is survived by an older brother Philip in Hyde Park, Mass. also by his brothers Frank and Joseph in Dorchester, Mass. He has also two sisters, Emma (Mrs. Mahoney) of Hyde Park also Margaret of Boston. Another sister is Mrs. Daniel Burke of Rollo Bay East, P. E. I. Canada. Interment was in the Brother's cemetery at Mont La Salle Napa California R. I. P.
