**REGISTRATION DELINQUENTS.**—In connection with the Registration of all persons over 16 years of age it has been arranged that after the 22nd inst. any person who has failed to register on that day may do so on making application to the different post offices throughout the Province. The duties of Postmasters commence on Monday morning the 24th and no person can be registered after the 22nd, except at the post office. There is no doubt the majority of the people will be registered on 22nd, but those who cannot attend to the matter on that day should make it a point to do so during the following week.

## THOSE INTERNED SAILOR LADS

Every once in a while some one asks about those unfortunate British sailors who at the very beginning of the war found themselves in Holland instead of Belgium and were, consequently, interned. There was held recently in London an art exhibition at which was offered for sale some of the work turned out by those men of the Royal Navy Brigade. Beautifully designed tea caddies are sold at almost ridiculously low prices. Dutch models have given incentive in some cases and good wood has made good carving in themselves and the little hint of homesickness on the part of the worker would appeal to any Allies. The covers of the boxes had pictures of His Majesty's ships sailing the boundless seas and the White Ensign appeared a little larger than life—and no wonder! One officer and two men on parole were allowed to exhibit the goods.

The American Red Cross has donated a sum to the Equipment Fund and donations from South Africa and Canada have inaugurated an Entertainment Fund. ### AN IRON FOUNDRY IN THE WAR AREA

An interesting narration of operation under unique and difficult conditions of an iron foundry in the war area is given by the correspondent of a British paper writing from the firing line in France. He relates: One does not see much foundry work out here, but a few weeks ago I was billeted in a town nearby, and actually saw a cupola in full blast. I at once got permission to have a look around, and was greatly surprised at what I saw. The foundry was a very primitive affair—just a little jolting shop—and was mostly run by French women and girls, superintended by a few men. These women were making work up to three or four hundred pounds in weight, and in a little side shop some half dozen women were making component parts of machinery by the simple method of bedding-in. I afterwards saw some of the finished work, and it would put to shame the work done by many of our so-called molders at home. The women work in ordinary dress, and work very clean and exact in both iron and brass, and also under shell fire and air raids. In the shop was a great hole where a German had dropped a great bomb the night before, but the women still worked on—Scientific American.
