TORONTO, April 8. - Fresh northerly winds; fair and cool.

OVERALL TO OPEN BASEBALL SCHOOL

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 21 - Orville Overall, who says he "won't play with the Cubs," is back in baseball. It is not as player, however, but as teacher.

Big Jeff has just announced that he is making plans to launch a baseball school in Southern California to instruct aspiring youngsters in the art of the game during the winter months and fit them for league engagements in the summer. In a general way he is following the ideas of Charley Carr, the Kansas City manager, who will start his school in Texas next fall, but with several important exceptions.

Overall's school, as he plans it, will take nobody as pupils except players who have been with a team of some sort of merit, either minor league, college or high school. They must pay their own expenses to his "school," which will be in Visalia, his birthplace, and if they fail to show sufficient promise, he will send them away at their own expense. But if they reveal latent ability, he will keep them and pay all their living expenses, at the same time signing them to a contract entitling him to dispose of their services for cash to league clubs, making his profit in this way. Another difference from Carr's scheme is that Overall intends to do all the teaching himself, where Carr plans to hire a number of coaches.

The former Cub is also considering playing a little baseball himself beginning this summer, pitching for the Visalia team of the newly organized San Joaquin valley league.

TUFTS AND BROWN WILL PLAY NEXT SATURDAY

MEDFORD, March 31 - The Tufts college varsity baseball team will open the college baseball season for the New England States on Saturday, Manager Atwater '13 of that team having completed arrangements for a game with the Brown varsity nine on Tufts Oval for that date.

This is the first time that Tufts and Brown teams have ever met on Tufts grounds, though they have played annual games in Providence. Last year in the game there, which wound up the Tufts season, the Brown and Blue players registered a 5 to 4 victory, their first over Brown.

Win Adams, a former Brown player, who was in the box for Tufts last season and pitched his team to a win, and it is hoped he will repeat this year.

MEETING OF PURE BRED HORSE BREEDERS' ASSOCIATION

A meeting of the Directors of the Pure Bred Horse Breeders Association was held in the office of the Department of Agriculture, on Saturday, at 11 a.m., the President, Mr. W. W. Crosby in the chair. After considerable discussion the following constitution was prepared to be submitted to the first meeting of the Association.

CONSTITUTION

(1) This Association shall be called "The Pure Bred Horse Breeders Association of Prince Edward Island."

OBJECTS

- The objects of the Association shall be (a) To encourage the breeding of Pure Bred Horses. (1) By co-operating with the Departments of Agriculture, Local and Federal, to interest and instruct farmers in the breeding of Pure Bred Horses. (2) By co-operating with the Exhibition associations to improve the judging of horses at Agricultural and Live Stock exhibitions. (3) By keeping a record of the Pure Bred Horses, owned by each of its members. (4) By encouraging the owners of Pure Bred Horses to have them inspected by a qualified Veterinarian.

MEMBERSHIP

Any owner of Pure Bred Horses who enrolls them with the Secretary of this Association may become a member on paying the enrolment fee of \$1.00 per annum.

OFFICERS

The officers of this Association shall consist of: a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary-Treasurer who shall be Secretary of Agriculture, and three Directors, one from each county, who shall be appointed at the Annual meeting and who shall also constitute the Executive Committee. The Commissioner of Agriculture for Prince Edward Island and the Executive Commissioner for the Dominion of Canada shall be Members of the Directorate and the Executive of this Association and shall enjoy all the powers and privileges of an annually elected Director or Executive officer.

ASSOCIATION YEAR

The Association Year shall be the Calendar year. The Annual Meeting shall be held in conjunction with the Annual Horse Show.

QUORUM

Not less than seven (7) members shall be a quorum at an Annual or General Meeting, and not less than three shall be a quorum at an officers' meeting or executive meeting. A meeting of the Association will be called at an early date when definite arrangements will be made for carrying on the work of the Association.

for Canada to have a voice in Imperial affairs or for imperial federation which could only come when the Canadian people were ready to surrender their local independence and allow another body to frame their tariff for them. As to the suggestion that the time should be fixed to terminate the discussion in Committee, he said, "Let us go on until we know more of the subject than we know at the present time."

The Premier replying to Sir Willfrid Laurier's statement that the gift of 35 millions was intended as a permanent policy said: that Mr. Laurier opposed the contribution and also a Canadian voice in Imperial affairs because he desired Canada to remain neutral in time of war. On this point the Premier said, "we must do either one thing or the other. If we are to remain part of the Empire we must take our part in defence of the Empire against all comers when any peril assails it."

If we desire to be neutral in time of war it is not becoming to take advantage of the prestige and protection of the flag of the Empire in time of peace. That is my view and seems to me it ought to be the view of all self-respecting Canadians. As far as this particular question is concerned Mr. Laurier in 1910 refused to submit a permanent naval policy to the people.

Mr. Borden then again urged the setting of a time for the conclusion of the debate. The Hon. Gentleman has recorded over and over again that this is a policy of permanent contribution. I desire speaking upon my responsibility as a member of this Government, to take the strongest possible exception to that I say in the first place that this is not a policy of contribution at all and I say in the second place that it is not a permanent policy. That was a statement of the 5th day of Dec. last and I have stated it on more than one occasion since and I repeat it again today in the strongest form of expression that parliament can give.
