IMPRESSIVE VICTORY

FOUR U.S. ICE RECORDS ARE BROKEN

Alex Hurd, of Kirkland Lake, Ontario, Is Individual Star of Meet.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) CHICAGO, Feb. 3—Four United States indoor ice skating records were smashed in the western indoor skating championships held here Saturday night at a record-breaking crowd of 17,500 spectators in the Chicago Stadium.

Alex Hurd of Kirkland Lake, Ont., was the individual star of the meet, winning all three events for class A men and establishing a new United States record in the two-mile race.

Kitty Klein of Buffalo, achieved two of the records. In the 440 yards she bettered the record made last year by Edith Kingmill of Winnipeg. Miss Klein came from second place in the last half to defeat Dorothy Franey of St. Paul. Mrs. Lella Brooks Potter was third. Her new record was 43.3; the old 43.5.

Miss Klein established her second record in Winnipeg's first semi-final heat in the 3-4-mile for class A women. She skated the distance in 2:18.1 as compared to her record of 2:22.6 last year. She won the final heat, but in slower time. Hattie Donaldson Briggs of Toronto was second and Mrs. Potter third.

Pat Maloney of Minneapolis set a new record in the 440-yard dash for boys under 14 years of age. He won the event in 42 seconds, replacing the old record of 43.8.

In setting the new record of 5:58.3, 1-10 second better than the established mark for the two-mile event Hurd went into the lead on the last lap and held it against Frank Stack, a fellow townsmen from Ontario's north. Eddie Schroeder of Chicago, United States Olympic team captain, fell early in the race, but managed to finish fourth.

Hurd also won the one-mile race with Stack again second. Marvin Swanson of Minneapolis, United States outdoor champion, failed to qualify in this event because he fell and crashed into the board in his semi-final heat.

The men's class A 440-yard event was an all-Canadian affair with Hurd again the winner. Stack was second and F. Plack of Toronto third. Hurd's time was 37.4.

Maroons Defeat Bruins

MONTREAL, Feb. 3.—Montreal Maroons today were a little closer to the top of the International National Hockey League Canadian division following a sparkling 3-1 victory over Boston Bruins here Saturday.

Before a crowd of 10,000, attracted by the possibility of a grudge battle in the first meeting of the season since the memorable night of Jan. 23 in Boston, the Maroons crept within nine points of the Toronto Maple Leafs, section leaders and hold four games in hand.

Baldy Northcott, Maroons' left-winger, scored a first period goal on a pass from Lionel Conacher game away for the Maroons. Parked in front of the Bruins' net, he snared a pass from Earl Robinson and slammed it home. In the final minute Hooley Smith beat Thompson on a gang play with Baldy Northcott and Russ Illicic.

Allan Cup Champions Disband

By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Feb. 3—The Montreal Canadiens, raised as one of the greatest amateur teams ever assembled, winners of the Allan Cup for the past two years were disbanded during the week-end by the Moncton Exhibition Association, sponsors of the team. It was announced tonight.

The outlawing of the team by the C.A.E.A. and the failure of the New Brunswick Big Three Mercantile League to attract patrons through the turnstiles, resulted in heavy financial losses for the sponsors and brought about their decision to disband the team.

The players will be given their releases from the club, it was said. Whether or not the Moncton Exhibition Association will be interested in amateur hockey next season, is a question to be considered at some future time, certainly not this season, officials of the Association stated.

MAY TAKE OVER CHICAGO STADIUM

Owner of Detroit Red Wings Looms As Greatest Sports Promoter.

(By Charles Dunkley, Associated Press Sports Writer) (By Guardian's Special Wire) CHICAGO, Feb. 3.—A massive man, master of a fortune in what is about to become the greatest sports operator in the United States, he is James Norris, Sr., of Chicago, owner of a grain company bearing his name. He is already interested in the Olympia arena in Detroit, costing \$5,000,000, Norris is set to acquire the Chicago Stadium, built at a cost of \$6,500,000 tomorrow when 13-deral Judge James Wilkerson releases the building from receivership and orders it turned over to Norris, largest stockholder.

Norris already has \$600,000 sunk into the building, largest of its kind in the world. He has already acquired it another \$400,000 will be required to settle unpaid obligations.

Norris, with his son, Jimmy Norris, Jr., and Arthur N. Wirtz, a Chicago real estate operator, will form a triumvirate to operate both the Detroit arena and the Chicago Stadium. They bought the Detroit Arena two years ago and then purchased Detroit Red Wings of the National Hockey League, the Olympic of the International Hockey League, and formed several amateur teams to keep the sport before the public in the motor city.

Norris, a big six-footer, weighing 225 pounds, he is an immensely enthusiastic follower of sports, particularly hockey and boxing. He frequently rewarded his Detroit players with a bonus of from \$50 to \$100 after each game when they made a spectacular drive a year ago for the National League championship.
