Supreme Court Gives Decision In Favor Of Railway

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Dec. 11.—The Supreme Court of Canada decided this morning that the Dominion government has power to authorize the Nipissing Central, which is a subsidiary of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, to cross Quebec crown lands in the gold mining district of Rouyn.

Annual Meeting British Empire Steel Company

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Dec. 11.—The annual meeting of the British Empire Steel Corporation Limited, which was held here at noon today, was routine in character being featured only by the extensive address of the President, Roy M. Wolvin, in which he outlined the labor situation and earnings position of the company.

Britain And Germany Sell Rails To Japan

(Special to the Guardian) TOKYO, Dec. 11.—The statement of the Railway department of the Japanese Government, November 26, that no United States rails would be used in its rail replacement program has caused a disturbance in commercial circles here, and United States steel agents have besieged the Department.

New Radio Tube To Do Household Work

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—Amazing possibilities for simplifying household work in the future were opened up today when V. K. Zwerykin, a physicist of the Westinghouse Electric research laboratories, gave a demonstration of his newly-invented improved radio tube. The tube, which is a combination of a photo-electric cell with a radiovacuum tube amplifier, was exhibited for the first time at the electrical show held here on October 20. At that time the new instrument was shown to be so sensitive that the smoke of a cigarette rang a bell and caused a radio loudspeaker to howl.

Bank Manager Pleads Guilty

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Dec. 11.—J. E. Mile Paulin, manager of the Ste. Agathe branch of the Banque Provinciale, appeared before Judge Monet in chambers this afternoon and pleaded guilty to the charge of converting \$21,000 of the banks' funds to his own use and falsifying books during the years 1923, 1924 and 1925. Paulin, who is married and the father of seven children, will be sentenced early in January.

Adjustment Of British Railway Trouble
