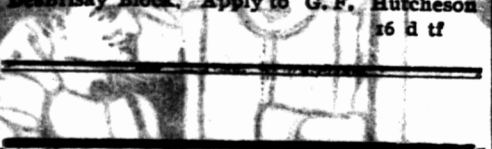

## CANADA'S SURPLUS LIKELY MORE THAN LAST YEAR

OTTAWA, July 9.—When the finance minister in his budget three months ago forecast a surplus of \$13,000,000 over the ordinary expenditure and a reduction in the public debt of \$5,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, he did not fully realize the increase which the receipts for May and June would show.

The accounts of last year will not be finally balanced till the middle of August and till then it is impossible to say just what the exact surplus will be. But the probability is that it will be more than \$14,000,000, far and away the largest surplus that Canada has ever known.

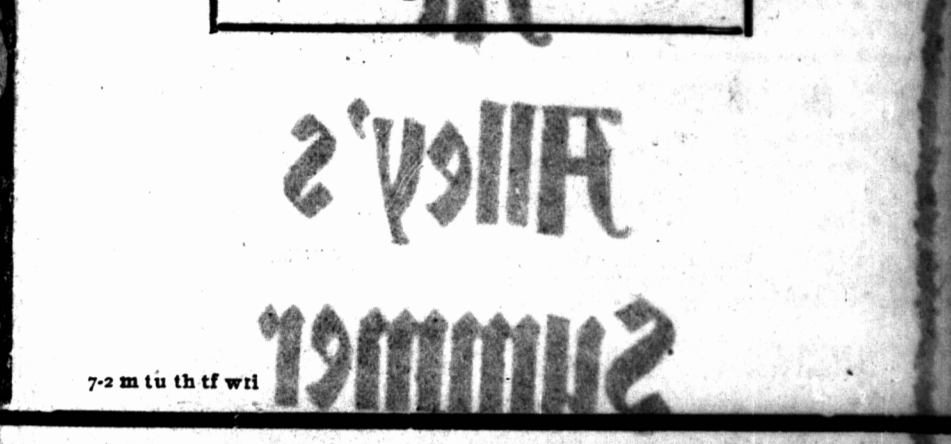
