ACQUAINTANCE WITH GOD

"Knowing thyself" was the maxim of an ancient philosopher. Know God is the plea of the Scriptures, and to aid in such knowledge is its aim. We cannot understand the religions of the world unless, as Jevons says, "We recognize that in them all there is the striving and yearning after God." Socrates, thinking upon the aspirations of his soul, hoped for immortality and tried to acquaint himself with God. The history of religion is a narrative of the quest of man for God. The history of Christianity is the history of the search for God of those who have had a divine revelation. The whole world is engaged to a greater or lesser extent in seeking after him.

On the other hand, God is attempting to reveal himself to the whole world, to prove his interest in human welfare, and to convince all men that God is their friend. Friendship implies a mutual interest. God cannot be the friend of one who rejects his compassion, interest, love, and confessions. God reveals himself to us in proportion to our capacity to receive such revelation. He dwells in the human heart, and two souls are interviewed. We hear God's voice when concession warms our commands; when great emotions stir the soul, the soul has touched God; great faith is produced by the visions of the soul immortal, sudden flashes of truth are the result of meditation upon the truths of God.

To know God is to have a Father who careth for his own, who loves us and asks that we might receive him. To know the Son is to know God; through the Son God manifests his hatred and iniquity, his regard for virtue, his power to aid us in sorrow, temptation, and distress for the Son brought life and immortality to light. The father sees the soul of man submerged beneath selfishness, lust, envy or avarice, but still the soul capable of immortality. The work of the Son is to lift up such a soul to its supremacy over all sensual desire to a place where that soul may commune with its Maker and God.
