

BALFOUR TO URGE EDUCATION BILL.

Authorizes Statement That Report of Its Withdrawal is Utterly Unfounded.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Despite all the protests of the Nonconformists, Mr. Balfour will urge his educational bill.

This morning a statement appeared in the Liverpool Daily Post that he had decided to withdraw it, and to this end, was in consultation with Lord Londonderry, President of the Board of Education.

Asked if this was true, the Premier this afternoon authorized the statement that "there is no foundation whatever for this rumor."

A similar denial was made by Colonial Secretary Chamberlain, who added with reference to the attitude of the Birmingham Liberal Unionists that "only two hundred persons attended the meeting of opponents of the bill."

The general body of the Presbyterian

and Baptist Independent ministers at a special meeting this evening passed a resolution calling on the Government to withdraw the bill and declaring:

"We will do everything in our power to defeat the reactionary, tyrannical proposals of the measure, which vast numbers of loyal subjects will be conscientiously compelled to resist to the utmost even to refusing the payment of rates."

The British Government's education bill was especially obnoxious to the nonconformists, who held that it placed supervisions of the schools and a monopoly of authority in the hands of the Anglican clergy. Many public demonstrations against it were held in England, and in more than one instance the meetings pledged themselves to refrain from paying taxes should the bill become a law.

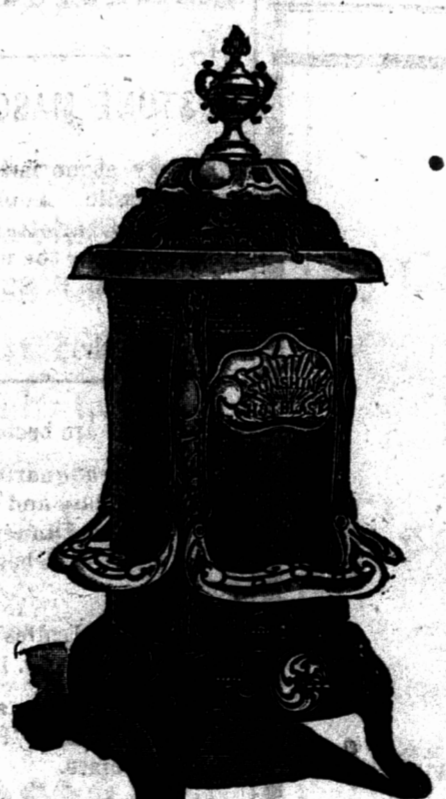
